BAPTISM

We welcome Stirling William Patrick Kane into the Body of Christ through Holy Baptism at 11.00am this morning. Welcome also to Stirling's parents, Colin and Sally, and to the Godparents and other family members and friends.

A reading from the book of Joshua Chapter 3: verses 7-17.

The LORD said to Joshua, 'This day I will begin to exalt you in the sight of all Israel, so that they may know that I will be with you as I was with Moses. You are the one who shall command the priests who bear the ark of the covenant, "When you come to the edge of the waters of the Jordan, you shall stand still in the Jordan." ' Joshua then said to the Israelites, 'Draw near and hear the words of the LORD your God.' Joshua said, 'By this you shall know that among you is the living God who without fail will drive out from before you the Canaanites, Hittites, Hivites, Perizzites, Girgashites, Amorites, and Jebusites: the ark of the covenant of the Lord of all the earth is going to pass before you into the Jordan. So now select twelve men from the tribes of Israel, one from each tribe. When the soles of the feet of the priests who bear the ark of the LORD, the Lord of all the earth, rest in the waters of the Jordan, the waters of the Jordan flowing from above shall be cut off; they shall stand in a single heap.'

When the people set out from their tents to cross over the Jordan, the priests bearing the ark of the covenant were in front of the people. Now the Jordan overflows all its banks throughout the time of harvest. So when those who bore the ark had come to the Jordan, and the feet of the priests bearing the ark were dipped in the edge of the water, the waters flowing from above stood still, rising up in a single heap far off at Adam, the city that is beside Zarethan, while those flowing towards the sea of the Arabah, the Dead Sea, were wholly cut off. Then the people crossed over opposite Jericho. While all Israel were crossing over on dry ground, the priests who bore the ark of the covenant of the LORD stood on dry ground in the middle of the Jordan, until the entire nation finished crossing over the Jordan.

Psalm 107.1-7, 33-37

O give thanks to the Lord, for he is good: for his loving mercy is for ever. Let the Lord's redeemed say so: whom he has redeemed from the hand of the enemy,

And gathered in from every land, from the east and from the west: from the north and from the south. Some went astray in the wilderness and in the desert: and found no path to an inhabited city;

They were hungry and thirsty: and their heart fainted within them. Then they cried to the Lord in their distress: and he took them out of their trouble.

He led them by the right path: till they came to an inhabited city.

He turns the rivers into desert: and springs of water into thirsty ground.

He makes of a fruitful land a salty waste: because its inhabitants are evil. He turns the wilderness into a pool of water: and parched ground into flowing springs.

And there he settles the hungry: and they build a city to live in. They sow fields and plant vineyards: which give them fruitful harvest.

A reading from the first letter of Paul to the Thessalonians, Chapter 3: verses 5-13.

For this reason, when I could bear it no longer, I sent to find out about your faith; I was afraid that somehow the tempter had tempted you and that our labour had been in vain.

But Timothy has just now come to us from you, and has brought us the good news of your faith and love. He has told us also that you always remember us kindly and long to see us—just as we long to see you. For this reason, brothers and sisters, during all our distress and persecution we have been encouraged about you through your faith. For we now live, if you continue to stand firm in the Lord. How can we thank God enough for you in return for all the joy that we feel before our God because of you? Night and day we pray most earnestly that we may see you face to face and restore whatever is lacking in your faith.

Now may our God and Father himself and our Lord Jesus direct our way to you. And may the Lord make you increase and abound in love for one another and for all, just as we abound in love for you. And may he so strengthen your hearts in holiness that you may be blameless before our God and Father at the coming of our Lord Jesus with all his saints.

Hear the word of the Lord.

Alleluia, **alleluia**, You have one Father, your Father in heaven; you have one teacher: the Lord Jesus Christ. **Alleluia!**

The Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew 23: verses 1–12.

Then Jesus said to the crowds and to his disciples, 'The scribes and the Pharisees sit on Moses' seat; therefore, do whatever they teach you and follow it; but do not do as they do, for they do not practise what they teach. They tie up heavy burdens, hard to bear, and lay them on the shoulders of others; but they themselves are unwilling to lift a finger to move them. They do all their deeds to be seen by others; for they make their phylacteries broad and their fringes long. They love to have the place of honour at banquets and the best seats in the synagogues, and to be greeted with respect in the market-places, and to have people call them rabbi. But you are not to be called rabbi, for you have one teacher, and you are all students. And call no one your father on earth, for you have one Father-the one in heaven. Nor are you to be called instructors, for you have one instructor, the Messiah. The greatest among you will be your servant. All who exalt themselves will be humbled, and all who humble themselves will be exalted.

FIVE HUNDRED YEARS SINCE THE REFORMATION

Last Tuesday, the 31st October, marked five hundred years since Martin Luther posted ninety-five theses for debate. Whether he actually nailed them to the door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg is not certain. His chief concern was the sale of indulgences, promoted as a fast track to heaven, the proceeds of which were to fund the building of St Peter's Basilica in Rome.

The Reformation not only resulted in the birth of many Protestant churches; it also led to the Catholic Reformation (sometimes called the Counter-Reformation). Last Tuesday, the Primates of the Church of England, the Archbishops of Canterbury and York, issued a statement recalling "the lasting damage done five centuries ago to the unity of the Church, in defiance of the clear command of Jesus Christ to unity in love." Justin Welby and John Sentamu said: "Those turbulent years saw Christian people pitted against each other, such that many people suffered persecution and even death at the hands of others claiming to know the same Lord. A legacy of mistrust and competition would then accompany the astonishing spread of Christianity in the centuries that followed."


This five hundredth anniversary commemoration, their statement concluded, should lead Christians "to repent of our part in perpetuating divisions. Such repentance needs to be linked to action aimed at reaching out to other churches and strengthening relationships with them." This statement followed a plea last autumn by Pope Francis for "forgiveness for divisions perpetuated by Christians from the two traditions." He said the anniversary was an "opportunity to mend a critical moment of our history by moving beyond the controversies and disagreements that have often prevented us from understanding each other."

Many of the goals of the Reformation have been realised in the Roman Catholic Church, especially since the Second Vatican Council. At a service in Westminster Abbey last Tuesday, Archbishop Justin Welby's address acknowledged the religious, political and social changes triggered by Luther, but also the Reformation's "dark side".

"For each of the things that came through the Reformation – good as they are, precious beyond compare, even – for each there is also a dark side," he said. "With new vigour came conflict. With individual understanding of grace came individualism and division . . . With literacy and freedom came new ways of cruelty refined by science. With missionaries bearing the faith came soldiers bearing the flag."

As we reflect on the legacy of the Reformation we can give thanks for its blessings and repent of the damage it caused. I like what United Methodist theologian Stanley Hauerwas said the other day: "Over time, historians have helped us see that there was no one thing the Reformation was about, but that if there was a single characteristic at its heart, it was the recovery of the centrality of Christ for making sense of why Christians are not at home in this world." Life make sense only as we live in Christ and Christ lives in us.
