LIGHTING OF THE SECOND ADVENT CANDLE

PREPARE A WAY FOR THE LORD. The season of Advent is a time in which we prepare for the Lord's coming. We prepare for the feast of Christmas which commemorates his first coming as a child in Bethlehem. And we prepare also for his final coming in glory. We do this by heeding John the Baptist's call to repentance, and by striving for 'peace through integrity, and honour through devotedness'.

The first candle reminded us of our *hope* in Christ. Today we light the candle of *peace*. The prophet Isaiah called Christ the 'Prince of Peace' and foretold that through him all nations would live in peace and justice. Jesus taught his followers to be peacemakers, and that those who make peace will be called the children of God. Christ brings peace into our lives and will bring everlasting peace when he comes to reign in glory.

Peace is like a light shining in a dark place. As we look at the light of this candle, we celebrate the peace we have in Jesus Christ.

The second candle is lit.

Lord Jesus, Light of the world, the prophets said you would bring peace and save your people from their sins. Give peace in our hearts as we await your coming. Help us in this season to discern your presence among us, to hear your word, and to share your peace with others. For your love's sake. Amen.

**The Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to
Luke , Chapter 3, verses 1 – 6**

Glory to you Lord Jesus Christ.

In the fifteenth year of the reign of Emperor Tiberius, when Pontius Pilate was governor of Judea, and Herod was ruler of Galilee, and his brother Philip ruler of the region of Ituraea and Trachonitis, and Lysanias ruler of Abilene, during the high-priesthood of Annas and Caiaphas, the word of God came to John son of Zechariah in the wilderness. He went into all the region around the Jordan, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins, as it is written in the book of the words of the prophet Isaiah,

'The voice of one crying out in the wilderness:
"Prepare the way of the Lord,
make his paths straight.
Every valley shall be filled,

and every mountain and hill shall be made low,
and the crooked shall be made straight,
and the rough ways made smooth;

SLOWING DOWN DURING ADVENT

Reading the above may likely provoke an outburst of laughter or the quip, “Are you kidding?” This time of year becomes a never-ending round of shopping and parties, preparing food, getting ready for holidays, and generally running from here to there with no time to “slow down”. The shops and streets get busier, nerves are frayed, and we go through fleeting moments when we ask ourselves if it’s all worth it. For retailers, Christmas begins some time in October and ends on Boxing Day. (I’ve even seen stores take down their decorations on Christmas Eve!) For the Church, Christmas begins *at* Christmas and continues for twelve days. Advent is the waiting season leading up to Christmas.

During Advent, we dress the altar and clergy in purple, we omit the *Gloria*, we sing hymns of anticipation and expectancy, often in a minor key – “O come O come Emmanuel”, for example- and we light candles on the wreath each Sunday to remind us of the light coming into the darkness. By contrast, the stores have Christmas trees and decorations everywhere, and the sound of carols fills the airwaves. Such a contrast - as though we live in two different worlds. Or, as Bishop Lindsay Urwin, the former

Administrator of the Shrine of Our Lady of Walsingham in England, who is now the Vicar of Christ Church Brunswick in Victoria, puts it, we live in two different time zones.

First, we live in 'liturgical time' or worship time. In this time zone, we reflect on the coming of Christ as a baby at Bethlehem, waiting with Mary and Joseph for the arrival of this strange new child who would be the very presence of God on earth. And yet, Jesus is already with us; he's no stranger to us, yet we await him as a reminder that we always need saving. Then there is the other arrival, the one for which we wait that is yet to happen. This is the arrival of Jesus to judge the world, his return to establish the fullness of his kingdom. We speak of judgement and death and heaven and hell. We hear John the Baptist calling us to repentance. These are the themes that the Church emphasises during these purple weeks.

But then we leave the church to go into the world, and we find there a different time zone with a different emphasis altogether. Bishop Urwin calls this time zone 'commercial time'. Not starting on Advent Sunday, but sometime in October. The focus is not joy at the coming of Jesus, "but the coming of cash and consumers who gorge themselves and bestow on others the things of this world, in a mixture of genuine generosity, temporary goodwill, and a vain hope that this Christmas will be more memorable than the last one" (Bishop Lindsay Urwin, *Walsingham Review*, p.3 Advent 2007).

So, in the midst of this, how do we keep a holy Advent? Obviously, we have to live in these two time zones. Jesus doesn't call us to abandon the world, although there have been Christians who've railed against the commercialism of Christmas and condemned Santa Claus. We can't be snooty about the world and hurl accusations against it that only serve to isolate us in a

religious ghetto and widen the gap that already exists between the church and the world. As Christians we are always called to live as Christ's disciples *in the world*. The very meaning of the Incarnation is *Emmanuel, God with us*. Puritanism is not the answer!

One solution would be to tap into the spiritual hunger many in our society and world are experiencing right now. There are signs that our culture is becoming increasingly disillusioned with a materialistic approach to life. Our liturgies on Christmas Eve (and to some extent on Christmas Day) are attended overwhelmingly by visitors. These provide opportunities to make the connection between these two time zones. Starting with what people know already, then gently leading them to the babe in the manger and the significance of it all is a way to proceed.

When I used to teach SRE in schools, rather than try to "drag" the children away from thoughts of Santa to the Christ child, I started where they are - thinking about Santa! I explained to them the origin of Santa in the figure of St Nicholas, the 4th century Bishop of Myra. I then made connections with what they knew of the baby Jesus, Mary, Joseph, Bethlehem, the manger and so on. I try to maintain a reflective attitude during Advent, while at the same time attend parties in the Parish and the community, recognising that it's no good trying to demand that people who live in 'commercial time' enter 'liturgical time' because they have no understanding of what it is.

Being a church in mission requires us to straddle the two time zones in order to make connections with people where they are; at the same time not giving in to the frenetic and frantic activity that marks so much of the season. If we don't have anything better to offer, we will end up trying so hard to be 'relevant' that

we lose any true relevance in the long term. This is not easy, yet it is essential if we are to be faithful to Our Lord's mandate to proclaim the gospel to the world. How will you live in the two time zones this Advent?
