Prayer of the Day

Undaunted you seek the lost, O God, exultant you bring home the found: touch our hearts with grateful wonder at the tenderness of your forbearing love; grant us delight in the mercy that has found us; and bring all to rejoice at the feast of forgiven sinners. We ask this through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God for ever and ever. **Amen.**

A reading from Exodus chapter 32, verses 7 – 14

The LORD said to Moses, 'Go down at once! Your people, whom you brought up out of the land of Egypt, have acted perversely; they have been quick to turn aside from the way that I commanded them; they have cast for themselves an image of a calf, and have worshipped it and sacrificed to it, and said, "These are your gods, O Israel, who brought you up out of the land of Egypt!" ' The LORD said to Moses, 'I have seen this people, how stiff-necked they are. Now let me alone, so that my wrath may burn hot against them and I may consume them; and of you I will make a great nation.'

But Moses implored the LORD his God, and said, 'O LORD, why does your wrath burn hot against your people, whom you brought out of the land of Egypt with great power and with a mighty hand? Why should the Egyptians say, "It was with evil intent that he brought them out to kill them in the mountains, and to consume them from the face of the earth"? WHY WE DO WHAT WE DO THREE KISSES

A kiss is a sign of affection and love. It is also a sign of respect in most cultures and religions. When we gather for the Eucharist, there are "three kisses" that have great symbolic meaning. These three kisses or forms of greeting occur at three significant points in the eucharistic liturgy.

The first kiss is made at the beginning of the liturgy when the priest approaches the altar. Kissing the altar may seem rather odd. After all, the altar is a material object made of wood, stone, marble, glass or some other substance. True, but the altar also has symbolic meaning. It represents the divine, the presence of God. The altar is consecrated by the bishop when the church is consecrated. The act of consecrating an altar is similar to the baptism of a new Christian. Holy oil or chrism, which is used to make the sign of the cross on the forehead after baptism, is applied to the altar surface. Then a white cloth similar to the white baptismal garment is placed on it. To kiss the altar is to recognise the presence of God and the holiness of the sacred mysteries which are to be celebrated at the altar. So yes, altars are material objects, but they have been set apart for a sacred

purpose and kissing the altar is a recognition of its special role and the significance of the sacrifice of Jesus Christ offered for us on the cross. The altar is a place of encounter between heaven and earth. We meet Christ at his altar when we come forward to receive Holy Communion. Our receiving Christ should be an act of great devotion and reverence.

The second kiss is at the reading of the Holy Gospel. Just as we meet Jesus Christ at his table, so we meet him when he speaks to us through the Gospel, the Good News of God's salvation. We stand for the Gospel as a sign of respect. We herald its reading with the Alleluia verse because the Gospel is *Good* News. We praise Jesus before and after the Gospel is read – "Glory to you, Lord Jesus Christ." When Jesus speaks to us his voice is authoritative. We call Jesus "Lord" recognising that his authority exceeds all earthly authorities and loyalties and allegiances. But unlike many of the authorities in our lives, Jesus is not a "boss" or a tyrant. His Lordship is one of service and sacrifice. After the priest or deacon reads the Gospel, he or she kisses the Book as a sign of devotion to the Word of God: to the Lord, the Living Word, who speaks to us through the written Word.

The third kiss may actually not be a kiss, but rather a handshake or an embrace. We meet Christ at his altar. We meet Christ through the Gospel. And we meet Christ in each other. The Greeting of Peace is a liturgical act which demonstrates our unity as members of the body of Christ. Depending on how well we know the person we are greeting, the form it takes may be a kiss, but probably more commonly, a handshake. The physical action is accompanied by the words, "Peace be with you" with the response, "And also with you." The Greeting of Peace is a liturgical action. It is not a "meet and greet" time. We are using the very same words Jesus did when he greeted his disciples after he rose from the dead: "Peace be with you." The risen Jesus, through the power of the Holy Spirit, once again speaks through us to our brothers and sisters in Christ. When we speak these words to each other, we are saying that we are not just another group of people which happens to meet together as friends. We are the Church of Jesus Christ. Our unity is grounded in that reality, not because we happen to belong to the same football club, or our kids attend the same school. We are family, brothers and sisters in Christ. The Peace moves us beyond ordinary human friendships. We greet those to whom we may or may not feel particularly close. We turn to those around us rather than go in search of our friends. We can only offer the Eucharist after we are reconciled to each other.
