LIGHTING OF THE THIRD ADVENT CANDLE

REJOICING IN GOD, OUR SAVIOUR. Christmas is a feast of joy and light. We celebrate God who comes to dwell among us and save us. With the prophet Isaiah, we exult for joy in the Lord. With Mary, our spirits rejoice in God our saviour. We do not deny the pain and evil that exist in the world, but we rejoice in the knowledge that nothing can come between us and the love of God made visible in Christ Jesus.

We have lit the candles of *hope* and *peace*. Today we light the candle of *joy*. In today's Epistle St Paul exhorts the Philippians to "rejoice always". The Latin for "rejoice" is *Gaudete*, so the Third Sunday in Advent has been called Gaudete Sunday. We rejoice not because things are always going well, but because the Lord has come, the Lord is coming, and the Lord will come. Knowing that the Lord is near eliminates worry and fear.

Joy is like a light shining in a dark place. As we look at the light of this candle, we celebrate the joy we find in Jesus Christ.

The third candle is lit.

Thank you, God, for the joy you give us. As we await the fulfillment of your promise, keep our joy alive. Help us today and every day, to worship you, to hear your word, and to do your will by sharing your joy with others. We ask this through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Sentence

Bind up the broken-hearted, proclaim liberty to the captives and release to the prisoners, proclaim the year of the Lord's favour, the day if vengeance of our God.

Prayer of the Day

Eternal God, you sent John the Baptist to prepare the way for the coming of your Son: grant us wisdom to see your purpose and openness to hear your will, that we too may prepare the way for Christ who is coming in power and glory to establish his rule of peace and justice; through Jesus Christ our Judge and our Redeemer, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. **Amen.**

A reading from Isaiah Chapter 61 verses 1-4 and 8-11

The spirit of the Lord God is upon me, because the Lord has anointed me; he has sent me to bring good news to the oppressed, to bind up the broken-hearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives, and release to the prisoners; to proclaim the year of the Lord's favour, and the day of vengeance of our God; to comfort all who mourn: to provide for those who mourn in Zion to give them a garland instead of ashes, the oil of gladness instead of mourning, the mantle of praise instead of a faint spirit. They will be called oaks of righteousness, the planting of the Lord, to display his glory. They shall build up the ancient ruins, they shall raise up the former devastations; they shall repair the ruined cities, the devastations of many generations. For I the Lord love justice, I hate robbery and wrongdoing; I will faithfully give them their recompense, and I will make an everlasting covenant with them. Their descendants shall be known among the nations, and their offspring among the peoples; all who see them shall acknowledge that they are a people whom the Lord has blessed. I will greatly rejoice in the Lord, my whole being shall exult in my God; for he has clothed me with the garments of salvation, he has covered me with the robe of righteousness, as a bridegroom decks himself with a garland, and as a bride adorns herself with her jewels. For as the earth brings forth its shoots, and as a garden causes what is sown in it to spring up, so the Lord God will cause righteousness and praise to spring up before all the nations.

Be at peace among yourselves. And we urge you, beloved, to admonish the idlers, encourage the faint-hearted, help the weak, be patient with all of them. See that none of you repays evil for evil, but always seek to do good to one another and to all. Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you. Do not quench the Spirit. Do not despise the words of prophets, but test everything; hold fast to what is good; abstain from every form of evil.

May the God of peace himself sanctify you entirely; and may your spirit and soul and body be kept sound and blameless at the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ. The one who calls you is faithful, and he will do this.

The Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John Chapter 1 verses 6-8 and 19-28

Glory to you Lord Jesus Christ.

There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. He himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the light.

This is the testimony given by John when the Jews sent priests and Levites from Jerusalem to ask him, 'Who are you?' He confessed and did not deny it, but confessed, 'I am not the Messiah.' And they asked him, 'What then? Are you Elijah?' He said, 'I am not.' 'Are you the prophet?' He answered, 'No.' Then they said to him, 'Who are you? Let us have an answer for those who sent us. What do you say about yourself?' He said, 'I am the voice of one crying out in the wilderness, "Make straight the way of the Lord"', as the prophet Isaiah said.

Now they had been sent from the Pharisees. They asked him, 'Why then are you baptizing if you are neither the Messiah, nor Elijah, nor the prophet?' John answered them, 'I baptize with water. Among you stands one whom you do not know, the one who is coming after me; I am not worthy to untie the thong of his sandal.' This took place in Bethany across the Jordan where John was baptizing.

For the Gospel of the Lord. **Praise to you Lord Jesus Christ.**

Father Roy writes: While I have watched and listened to the events of the pandemic in Australia during the past fortnight two events have stuck in my mind. The first was the case of two overseas travellers who took a flight from Sydney to Melbourne without having hotel quarantined in Sydney. Secondly, and more recently, the opening of state borders to travellers without having to quarantine on arrival. In the first incident the travellers knew what should have been done but when they were excepted from Sydney went looking to quarantine in Melbourne.

The second incident meant freedom of movement within Australia.

What are these two incidents saying to the Churches? Many people know how to behave ethically and to live a "good life" but from time-to-time mistakes are made, temptation becomes too great and then the person seeks some kind of redemption to put things right again.

Redemption is the backbone of the Churches. Redemption is found in our Lord Jesus Christ. God's love is such that God gave his only-begotten Son to live and die an earthly life for the redemption of all people. This is the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ which we, the Church in this place, proclaim to people who will listen. PRAY for our evangelistic endeavours with people in our lives.

The second incident is about freedom for people within the Churches. Freedom comes when we have God at the centre of our lives. "Thy will be done" becomes very real in our lives and is our constant prayer. We are aware of God's continued love for us "warts and all" and we respond to that love by our love for God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit, our love for others and for ourselves as God loves.

Come Holy Spirit, come and touch the lives of your people.

Open our lips, Lord, that our mouth shall proclaim your praise.

Our help is in the Name of the Lord who made heaven and earth.

May the Lord, when he comes,

find us watching and waiting.

Amen.

Keep well, keep safe and the blessing of God be upon you and on all who you love and may your days and nights be holy, good and peaceful.

Advent 3

Isaiah 61.1-4, 8-11; Either Psalm 126 or The Song of Mary;
 1 Thessalonians 5.12-28; John 1.6-8, 19-28

In this week's Gospel we have part of John's stunning Prologue. We also have John's introduction of John the Baptiser. The one who sets the scene for the coming Messiah. John's appearance is prophesied. In fact, he is the last of the Old Testament style of prophets, coming out of the wilderness and preaching judgement and repentance. John makes it very clear that he is not the Messiah and points to the one to come. Jesus will turn up soon enough.

From the very beginning of the narrative in John's Gospel there is a tension with the Jewish leaders who want to know "who are you?" - first John and then Jesus himself. The rest of the Gospel is taken up with answering this question.

Mission News - 13th December, 2020 The Christmas Bowl Helping refugees rebuild with joy in Sri Lanka



Joy is that soaring feeling in your soul when Christ's gift first enters your life. But joy is hard to find when civil war forces you from your homeland for decades and then a pandemic threatens your resettlement. This Christmas, please help returned Sri Lankan refugees overcome their challenges and help them build a safe, happy future.

It's been 30 years since Rashan* and his wife Pamodi* fled conflict in Sri Lanka with their eight-year-old daughter. But he'll never forget their terrifying boat journey to India: "The boat was overloaded with people and so heavy it barely peeped out of water...We made our daughter lie on top of our luggage box. A boat ahead of us was damaged by gunfire. We were scared and doubtful if we would reach our destination."

The family found safety in India, but life was difficult. They spent 27 years in a refugee camp surviving on food rations. They longed to return home. After peace had settled in Sri Lanka, Rashan and Pamodi travelled back to reclaim her family land. But they were starting all over again – with no jobs, no money and nothing to prove their rights to their land. People like Rashan and Pamodi were already struggling to rebuild in their homeland after decades of displacement. Now COVID-19 has made that task even harder. Through your gift to the Christmas Bowl, you will bring them the support they urgently need to build new homes, livelihoods and futures. Your kindness makes it possible for Act for Peace's partner, the Organisation for Eelam Refugees' Rehabilitation (OfERR), to support returned Sri Lankan refugees at this difficult time. With help from OfERR and caring Christians like you, Rashan and Pamodi were able to take back their land and build a temporary home to live in. Of ERR also helped them to install a bore well and water pump, so they could grow and sell food. Today, their thriving farm even provides work to other families. After decades of fear, hardship and uncertainty, Rashan and Pamodi have finally found joy again. They are reconnecting with long-lost relatives, and hope their daughter and her husband and children will join them soon from India. Rashan summed up the difference you can this Christmas Bowl: "If I had stayed back in India, I wouldn't have found this kind of life. There, we had to depend on the government for food. Here we have our land, our farm. The joy we got when we escaped with our lives to get here was unimaginable." *Names changed to protect identities as returned refugees.



2020 ADVENT AND CHRISTMAS APPEAL

This Christmas and Advent, ABM is asking you to help people in Australia, Zambia and Kenya to be empowered to live life to the full.

For Zambian communities, particularly those on the receiving end of gender-based violence (GBV), living life to the full is made possible by changing mindsets. It means spreading the word – to men and women alike – that violence is not the way to solve problems, and that girls have a right to complete their education, rather than being sent off into early marriages. It also means addressing the causes of poverty.

ABM's Integrated Gender project in Zambia empowers people to end gender-based violence through door-to-door sensitizations and community drama performances. It returns girls who have been forced into early marriages back to their families and schools, and offers economic empowerment to survivors of violence, assisting them also to become advocates for their own rights. The project provides counselling and further support to the survivors. It engages church, school and traditional leaders to work with families to bring an end to harmful cultural practices such as child marriage.

The project has also established "Savings with Education" groups to enable people living in poverty, and particularly women and GBV survivors, to develop small business enterprises so that school fees can be paid and people can look forward to a better life. Your donation can help train and grow networks of men's groups, like the one Peter (pictured) belongs to. Groups have been created in the churches to spread the word - acting as role models, and encouraging other men to say a firm 'NO 'to gender-based violence.
