ASH WEDNESDAY AND LENT

At one of my former parishes, attendances at the Ash Wednesday liturgies steadily increased year by year over the six years and four months I served as Parish Priest there. It was not unusual, after the Services ended, for people to remark how they were deeply touched during the liturgy. I observed visible signs of worshippers being moved as we prayed through the Service. They were encouraging signs. Despite the growth overall, numbers were still nowhere near as great as those on Sundays. One's reaction to that could be disappointment.

On the other hand, we could be surprised that there are people in our society who are still willing to make the effort to come to an occasion where they are smeared on the forehead with ash and told to remember that they are dust and will one day become dust again! Then we all get down on our knees and list the wrong things we have done, said and thought. We tell God we're sorry and we ask forgiveness. We are given suggestions on how to observe Lent, the 40-day period before Easter. Much of this observance involves giving up certain things that we enjoy eating, drinking, smoking, seeing, touching. What's the attraction in that? Why do they come?

I suspect Lent provides an opportunity to be real and honest about our condition and to do something positive about it. We are not perfect and we know it. In a world where there is much unreality, falsehood, denial and pretence, it's refreshing to be able to say, "I've blown it, I've failed, and I admit it. But God loves me, accepts me, helps me to confess my sins and mistakes and gives me the opportunity to start again, to make a new beginning. All because of what Jesus Christ has done on the cross."

It also provides an opportunity to be more focused in prayer and study of the scriptures. It gives us a chance to clear away some of the clutter in our lives, to remove obstacles to our progress in becoming more truly human. Many things we're told are essential, we can do without. Over consumption has a dehumanising effect. We can identify more closely with the poor, with victims of disaster and do something practical to help. Come and find new life and experience a new beginning this Lent.

LENT 2021

Our Lenten journey begins on Ash Wednesday which this year is the 17th February. With Christians around the world, we go into the wilderness, a place of clarification, of stripping down to the essentials, of refocusing our lives on God. Jesus was in the tradition of holy people who spent time in the loneliness and harshness of the desert - Moses, Elijah, John the Baptist - where they were able to focus on God without material comforts and other distractions, in order to pray and spend time with God. Various practices assist us in doing this: studying and meditating on the scriptures, prayer, fasting and abstinence, giving to the poor and needy, being more dedicated in receiving the sacraments, especially penance and the Eucharist, as we seek to live out and renew our baptismal calling to daily die to sin and be raised to new life in Christ.

ASH WEDNESDAY LITURGIES

The Eucharist, including the Imposition of Ashes and a penitential litany, will be celebrated on **Ash Wednesday 17th February** at **8.30am**, **12 midday** and **5.00pm** in the Church.

LENTEN STUDIES

There will be two groups meeting: one on **Thursdays** at **7.30pm** (commencing **18th Feb.**) and one on **Fridays** at **11.30am** (commencing **19th Feb.**), following the 10.30am Eucharist. The study booklets have been ordered. The *lectio divina* (spiritual reading) group will meet after the 5pm Eucharist on **Wednesdays** (commencing **17th Feb**). The Lenten study books will cost \$9.95. For those attending a study, please pay cash on the first day at the study. For those purchasing the study book only, please place your money into an envelope with your name and "Lenten study book" on the envelope and place it in the offertory plate as you arrive to register for attendance. **Fr. Roy writes**: Most of us will have been stressed during this Coronavirus pandemic. At first, it was persons in the older age group who were most vulnerable to contracting the virus, then it was younger people who were contracting the virus and eventually it reached down to the very young. Woe is me, is no one safe! There is no wonder that we are stressed. People of all ages are still contracting the virus with its many different new strains.

Now there is a new stress to which people are being subjected. It relates to the best vaccine for which age group. Will it act for me and my particular age group? Will I require one or more doses and how long will it last? These are the questions that leads to the stress.

Where does this fit into my spirituality/religious life? Our church calendar goes from the Sundays after the Epiphany, that is, the revelation of Jesus to the Gentiles, that is, the Non-Jews, in other words US, to Ash Wednesday and the days of Lent leading up to the Passion, Crucifixion and Death of Jesus. This can be an important time in my life when I am relieved of the stresses in my life through repentance and a true turning to God, the God of love, compassion, forgiveness and peace. Self-examination is good for the soul and my spiritual life. Where have I fallen short in thought, word and deed in my living the life of a disciple of Christ Jesus? I confess this to God and receive God's forgiveness and love. I try to live life prayerfully and renew it day by day.

I saw a Peanuts comic recently that showed Charlie Brown carrying Snoopy. There was a piece of writing about it and this is it: "In life it's not where you go, it's who you travel with carefully with love, compassion and humour. The road is long you need to enjoy it together." My immediate thought was that this was like my relationship with God. It is God who is carrying me on my journey through life. Most of the time I do not know exactly where I am going but God is carrying me with love, compassion, forgiveness, humour and peace.

Your life is like this because we are human beings who are subject to breaking away from our relationship with God. We are given, however, the opportunity in seasons like Lent to have a good think about where we are going in life and with whom we are travelling. May your Lenten discipline as a disciple of Jesus Christ be one of great blessing to you as God carries you on this part of your spiritual/religious journey and you are prayerfully and consciously aware of who is with you wherever your journey may take you.

Our help is in the Name of the Lord, who made heaven and earth. Come, Son of God Incarnate, Jesus of Nazareth, come and touch the lives of your people.

Keep well, keep safe and the blessing of God be upon you and on all who you love and may your days and nights be holy, good and peaceful. AMEN.

A reading from 2 Kings Chapter 5 verses 1-14

Naaman, commander of the army of the king of Aram, was a great man and in high favour with his master, because by him the LORD had given victory to Aram. The man, though a mighty warrior, suffered from leprosy. Now the Arameans on one of their raids had taken a young girl captive from the land of Israel, and she served Naaman's wife. She said to her mistress, 'If only my lord were with the prophet who is in Samaria! He would cure him of his leprosy.' So Naaman went in and told his lord just what the girl from the land of Israel had said. And the king of Aram said, 'Go then, and I will send along a letter to the king of Israel.'

He went, taking with him ten talents of silver, six thousand shekels of gold, and ten sets of garments. He brought the letter to the king of Israel, which read, 'When this letter reaches you, know that I have sent to you my servant Naaman, that you may cure him of his leprosy.' When the king of Israel read the letter, he tore his clothes and said, 'Am I God, to give death or life, that this man sends word to me to cure a man of his leprosy? Just look and see how he is trying to pick a quarrel with me.' But when Elisha the man of God heard that the king of Israel had torn his clothes, he sent a message to the king, 'Why have you torn your clothes? Let him come to me, that he may learn that there is a prophet in Israel.' So Naaman came with his horses and chariots, and halted at the entrance of Elisha's house. Elisha sent a messenger to him, saying, 'Go, wash in the Jordan seven times, and your flesh shall be restored and you shall be clean.' But Naaman became angry and went away, saying, 'I thought that for me he would surely come out, and stand and call on the name of the LORD his God, and would wave his hand over the spot, and cure the leprosy! Are not Abana and Pharpar, the rivers of Damascus, better than all the waters of Israel? Could I not wash in them, and be clean?' He turned and went away in a rage. But his servants approached and said to him, 'Father, if the prophet had commanded you to do something difficult, would you not have done it? How much more, when all he said to you was, "Wash, and be clean"?' So he went down and immersed himself seven times in the Jordan, according to the word of the man of God; his flesh was restored like the flesh of a young boy, and he was clean.

Ordinary Sunday 6[Epiphany 6] – Sunday 14 February 2021

- 2 Kings 5.1-14; Psalm 30;
 - 1 Corinthians 9.24-27; Mark 1.40-45

Both Elisha and Jesus cure lepers. When Jesus heals it is through the faith of the leper who knows Jesus can cure him with a mere movement of will. But Naaman does not accept his cure from Elisha at first because it's too easy. Naaman's cure is simply to immerse himself in the Jordan. Naaman is outraged that Elisha did not come out in person or wave his arms around. God does not need to appear in person or give us great and spectacular signs for us to experience God's love and healing.
