A reading from the Letter of Paul to the Hebrews Chapter 11, verses 29 – 12.2

By faith the people passed through the Red Sea as if it were dry land, but when the Egyptians attempted to do so they were drowned. By faith the walls of Jericho fell after they had been encircled for seven days. By faith Rahab the prostitute did not perish with those who were disobedient, because she had received the spies in peace.

And what more should I say? For time would fail me to tell of Gideon, Barak, Samson, Jephthah, of David and Samuel and the prophets— who through faith conquered kingdoms, administered justice, obtained promises, shut the mouths of lions, quenched raging fire, escaped the edge of the sword, won strength out of weakness, became mighty in war, put foreign armies to flight. Women received their dead by resurrection. Others were tortured, refusing to accept release, in order to obtain a better resurrection. Others suffered mocking and flogging, and even chains and imprisonment. They were stoned to death, they were

and universities and often in decision-making processes. Their ministry is exercised in these situations and it is not always easy to maintain Christian values and behaviour. This is where it is the responsibility of the clergy to support and nurture the laity in the Christian faith and values and its application in the daily life of society if they are to exercise their ministry of reconciliation.

On the other hand, the ministry of the laity is not a pale imitation of the ministry of the clergy. The ministry of the laity has too much dignity and importance to be reduced to these terms. The clergy and the laity share the universal ministry that belongs to the whole people of God. The most effective ministries of reconciliation by both laity and clergy are those that are backed up by the nurture of word and sacrament.

I cannot leave this writing on ministry without drawing attention to the call of some members of the laity to consider God's call to them of the ministry of ordination to the diaconate and priesthood. This possibility must be presented to our people for their consideration and also the call to a ministry in the religious life of a friar, and monk or a sister living and exercising their ministry of reconciliation within the life of a religious community under vows of poverty, chastity and obedience.

Living this life of ministry within the life of the Church as laity, clergy or religious among the tensions that are present within the Church and the world is not easy. If we are realistic we need to be patient and to act where we are with the means that we have, doing the best we can even though all of this may be far from perfect. In this we have hope that God will accept our ministries as our spiritual sacrifices that are acceptable to God through our Lord Jesus Christ.

Fr. Roy writes:

Recently I wrote to you on the subject of ministry within the Church, The Body of Christ. We, then, are servants or slaves of the "Servant of the Lord", Jesus Christ. Jesus, himself, is the agent of God's reconciling work. St. Paul points out in 2 Corinthians, chapter 5, verse 18 that the Church has a ministry of reconciliation. This ministry of reconciliation is given by God to those who themselves have been reconciled to him through Christ. This fundamental ministry of the Church belongs to every Christian because according to St. Peter's teaching we are "a royal priesthood" or "a holy priesthood to offer spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ".

This universal ministry belongs to all Christians, laity and clergy alike. The clergy are part of the People of God. They were laity before being ordained and still have that ministry with the additional ministry of a deacon, priest or bishop. In to-day's society, the clergy generally work in "holy places" and do not have access to many parts of to-day's society. This leaves a vast potential for other members of the laity, the "People of God", to exercise the Church's ministry of reconciliation in all parts of society.

God throughout the ages has been concerned with justice and peace and through Jesus aspects of help for the needy and healing for the sick. These are areas in which the laity can exercise their influence in associations that are given to justice and peace and to help for the needy and healing for the sick. They are not regarded by society as "churchy" or "religious" associations, but never the less, are within the ministry of the laity. These things can be done in association with other Christians who share in this concept of the Church's ministry. The laity of the Church is involved in the everyday workings of government, industry, technology, teaching in schools, colleges
