

Mission Report 22nd September 2013. Mission to Seafarers - part 1

Fr. Chris Bird, Chairman of the Mission to Seafarers has noted in his Report to Synod that the Mission experienced a 271% increase in passengers over the last four years. This only accounts only for those Seafarers who are recorded boarding the bus at the vessel (excluding those who walk / dropped off at the centre). Fr Chris states that the Port is expected to double in trade over the next seven years. This increase will require the Mission Chaplains and volunteers to meet the annual needs of 100,000 Seafarers who enter the Port of Newcastle.

The Chaplains - **Reverends Garry Dodd** and **Michael Davies** coordinate the ship visitations, and are supported by volunteers in this ministry, and also at the Mission Centre which is open from 10am to 10pm seven days a week (9,582 hours of voluntary work recorded last year) Fr Chris said '**the monetary value of these volunteers is enormous. The spiritual and emotional support is priceless...an incredible sacrifice in serving the stranger in their midst'**.

Please continue with your generous support towards the Parish contributions to the Mission to Seafarers through your donations - especially bibles, magazines, and knitted beanies. Monetary donations can also be offered. This is an important time of the year for the mission to receive the beanies, as there will be an even greater need for them, as the Seafarers head into the northern seas, and the cooler autumn and winter months. To be continued next week.

A reading from the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke, Chapter 16. 1 - 13.

Glory to you, Lord Jesus Christ

Then Jesus said to the disciples, 'There was a rich man who had a manager, and charges were brought to him that this man was squandering his property. So he summoned him and said to him, "What is this that I hear about you? Give me an account of your management, because you cannot be my manager any longer." Then the manager said to himself, "What will I do, now that my master is taking the position away from me? I am not strong enough to dig, and I am ashamed to beg. I have decided what to do so that, when I am dismissed as manager, people may welcome me into their homes." So, summoning his master's debtors one by one, he asked the first, "How much do you owe my master?" He answered, "A hundred jugs of olive oil." He said to him, "Take your bill, sit down quickly, and make it fifty." Then he asked another, "And how much do you owe?" He replied, "A hundred containers of wheat." He said to him, "Take your bill and make it eighty." And his master commended the dishonest manager because he had acted shrewdly; for the children of this age are more shrewd in dealing with their own generation than are the children of light. And I tell you, make friends for yourselves by means of dishonest wealth so that when it is gone, they may welcome you into the eternal homes.

'Whoever is faithful in a very little is faithful also in much; and whoever is dishonest in a very little is dishonest also in much. If then you have not been faithful with the dishonest wealth, who will entrust to you the true riches? And if you have not been faithful with what belongs to another, who will give you what is your own? No slave can serve two masters; for a slave will either hate the one and love the other, or be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and wealth.'

Some Thoughts on the Gospel Luke, Chapter 16. 1 - 13.

Jesus said, "If then you have not been faithful with the dishonest wealth, who will entrust to you the true riches?" [Luke 16.11]

The teaching of Jesus in Luke chapter 16 deeply reflects the literary genre 'parable'. When our Lord teaches in parables he is almost inevitably inviting us to engage deeply and to work deliberately to extricate meaning. As a teaching tool, parables invite the learner to explore and struggle and to be open.

Further, Biblical parables are a fertile example of our need, as twenty first century readers, to seek for and respect the metaphors, mindset and experiences of the first audience, the peoples of Bible times. We do well as readers of the sacred text to be wary of prejudice and superficial and uninformed intuition as we seek an authoritative understanding of the Scriptures original meaning. Certainly we must also be very wary of the temptation to try to make the text suit our purpose or to try to employ it out of context.

In this context, Professor Bailey, a contemporary Middle Eastern Bible scholar, has documented some very helpful material. For example he contends that we do well to know and understand the way our ancient forebears thought and then reflected those thought patterns in literature. Specifically related to the parable in Luke 16.1-13 [the parable of the dishonest manager], Bailey argues that a quintessential and ancient rhetorical device is in view, and that is, an argument 'from the lesser to the greater'. In the case of the parable of the dishonest manager the argument would go that if the manger can produce a good outcome for the debtors for all the wrong reasons, then how much more can true motives produce wholesome outcomes for the oppressed.

The text of the parable of the dishonest manager is dense and in places difficult to translate definitively. For example, scholars question the meaning of verse eight and in particular the term 'his master', as rendered by the NRSV. /continued

The Gk words used are '*ho kyrios*" and can be translated as either "the master" meaning the master in the parable, or "the Lord" meaning Jesus. In his exegetical text on Luke, Robert Tannehill writes, 'Since the master in the parable has already been called *'kyrios'* three times, it would be an awkward shift to mean Jesus in verse 8. Yet there is some awkwardness in any case. If *kyrios* refers to the master of the parable, we have not been told how he learned of his manager's manoeuvre or why he reacted in this surprising way.' However Tannehill goes on to write, 'Fortunately, our understanding of the parable does not depend heavily on deciding who is commending the steward. It is quite important to note that the steward is being commended, for otherwise he would appear to be a negative example.'

Tannehill goes on to talk of the apparent dissonance when the manager is commended and yet described as both dishonest and yet shrewd. What is the commendation all about? What possible 'good example is being set"? Perhaps an acceptable answers are possible as we set them in the rhetorical device mentioned previously, arguing from 'the greater to the lesser.'

However what values are at stake here to argue about? Tannehill goes on to exegete the term dishonest wealth as appearing in Luke 16.9..." And I tell you, make friends for yourselves by means of dishonest wealth so that when it is gone, they may welcome you into the eternal homes."

In this text 'they' refers to the debtors as such people reflect vulnerability to injustice oppression. The term 'dishonest wealth' can be translated literally as 'the mammon of wrongdoing' or "injustice" "Mammon" is derived from a Hebrew or Aramaic" term for wealth. If Tannehill's translations and logic can be sustained then it would appear that this parable is richly ethical and invokes the great Old Testament principles of *righteousness*, *justice* and *mercy*. The same principles are of course the very essence of the life of Jesus in healing relationships. Jesus dwells where humanity is at risk, poignantly apparent amongst the marginalised and oppressed, those who experience degradation, abuse and consequent atrophy. The Gospel of God dares to dwell in that injustice to render perfect healing and an abundance of wholesome life.

If this is a theological underpinning of the parable of the dishonest manager then the "debtors" may well be the poignant figures of abuse and oppression actually or potentially. Certainly they are extremely vulnerable if their debts are the means of abuse. Just so the wealthy in this context are in a very powerful position and wealth can be, note, *can be*, a source of abuse and oppression.

In this parable, for his own self-serving reasons which render his dishonesty', the manager relieves some of the debt. For the debtors, probably unaware of the dishonest managers base motives', they experience his behaviour as "good news". Their circumstances are greatly modified and their vulnerabilities at least partially ameliorated. For all the wrong reasons the dishonest manager has rendered hope, the apparent source of wealth has not been oppressive and the lives of the debtors changes.

In the context of rhetoric which argues from "the lesser to the greater" the dishonest manager remains both dishonest and shrewd but his actions bless. If such can be the outcome for wrong motives, then how much more powerful might human behaviour be if we deeply embrace the essence of God's Gospel, that is, righteous Jesus relationships which are just and merciful. Then, even the temptations of wealth can render hope and healing. *Brian Gibbs*
