SYNOD REPORT - OCTOBER 23RD & 24TH 2015

Myself, Dianne Fernance and Coralie Taylor recently attended the second session of the fifty first Synod of the Diocese held at The Bishop Tyrrell College near Newcastle.

Synod was quite confronting with a number of serious issues related to the past sexual abuse of children.

Bishop Greg opened Synod with his charge that we "Love our Neighbour". He then spoke at length that our neighbour is:

- The survivor of sexual abuse
- The survivor of domestic violence
- The homeless person
- The person on low income
- The refugee
- Those affected by climate change

As you can understand some of these matters can be very difficult to accept, understand and then deal with.

In line with the Diocese vision of "facing the past and shaping a healthy future" Bishop Greg then also spoke of how we can move forward and assist our neighbours through Mission Action and by being clear who we are.

At the completion of the Bishop's charge we watched a short recorded interview with 2 men who were sexually abused as children. One was abused by a priest, the other, who was present at Synod, by the man known to the family. The men spoke how the incidents had impacted their lives and the lives of those around them. This was quite an emotional experience and we must support and admire their courage to speak out.

The Business of Synod

In line with the vision, "facing the Past and shaping a healthy future", there was number of motions dealt with at Synod in relation to the past sexual abuse and changes to financial arrangements and the Professional Standards Ordinance to allow for the future to be managed.

There were a number of key motions passed at Synod:

- Apology for sexual abuse
- Shaping a Healthy Future
- Recognising Respectful Relationships
- Financial Strategy
- Diocesan Ordinances

Apology for sexual abuse

The first was a motion that the Synod affirms the apology made at the General Synod. The full wording is shown below as I think it is most important that we all consider this very carefully:

"That this Diocesan Synod affirms the apology made by the General Synod of the Anglican Church of Australia in Fremantle in 2004 and in so doing states. "That this Synod and we as members of it acknowledge with deep regret and repentance the past failings of the Church and its members. On behalf of the whole Anglican Church in the Diocese we apologise unreservedly to those who have been harmed by sexual abuse perpetrated by people holding positions of power and trust in the Church. We apologise for the shameful way we actively worked against and discouraged those who came to us and reported abuse. We are ashamed to acknowledge that we only took notice when the survivors of abuse became a threat to us. We apologise and ask forgiveness for the Church's failure at many levels to listen to and to acknowledge the light of those who have been abused, to take adequate steps to assist them, and to prevent abuse from happening or reoccurring. We commit the Church to listen to survivors of abuse to respond with compassion to all those who have harmed, both those who have come forward and to those who may choose to do so in the future, and to deal appropriately, transparently and fairly with those accused of abuse and negligence"

A number of people spoke passionately about the subject before the motion was passed.

Shaping a Healthy Future

This motion was to express thanks for the leadership of the Bishop and pledging towards making the Church a safe place for all people. To express our determination to take actions of integrity, transparency, accountability and respect.

Recognising Respectful Relationships

This was a 9 part motion that dealt with the topic of domestic and family violence and how in the past some interpretations of the scripture had condoned such actions and allowed concepts of violence against women and children.

The motion was set out to address the past with an apology but included concepts and an approach to move forward. The motion concluded with Diocese support for the Samaritans and White Ribbon Day in the movement to stop violence against women.

During this motion we were shown an emotional presentation of victims of domestic and family violence.

Financial Strategy

The focus of this motion was to deal with the future claims for sexual abuse. To date the Diocese has paid about \$5m in claims and estimates another \$3m to be expected in the future. The Financial strategy sets out ways that the Diocese can be in a position to meet these payments.

The key strategies are:

- All Parish accounts are to be held in the ASDF. In this way the Diocese will receive the management fee which is expected to return about \$300,000 pa.
- 2. Levy on Parishes All parishes pay a one off 10% surcharge levy calculated on the assessable income. This would generate about \$66,000 pa
- Property levy Currently 10% from the sale of property is paid to Funds within the Diocese. An additional 5% will be levied on these transactions. This would generate between \$25,000 - \$100,000 pa

There was discussions regarding other options but these were considered unacceptable. The motion was passed.

Diocesan Ordinances

There were changes to a number of Ordinances that related to the Professional Standards and the role of the Professional Standards Board.

These were designed to strengthen to role of the board in dealing with matters passed to them, expanded the definition of those who can be dealt with and importantly changed the current somewhat secret arrangements so that determinations and recommendations will be in an open sitting.

THE 11TH HOUR, OF THE 11TH DAY, OF THE 11TH MONTH The Story Behind the Remembrance Poppy

The wearing of the Red Poppy was inspired by the poem in Flanders Field. Miss Moina Belle Michael after reading the poem made a personal pledge on the 9th of November 1918, two days before Armistice was signed, to always wear a red poppy of Flanders Fields as a sign of remembrance. A resolution was passed in Australia that from 11th November 1921 the red Memorial Poppy was to be worn on Armistice Day in Australia. The American and French Children's League sent a million artificial poppies to Australia for the 1921 Armistice Day commemoration. The Returned Soldiers and Sailors Imperial League sold poppies before 11th November. A poppy was sold for a shilling each. Of this, five pennies were donated to the Returned Soldiers and Sailors Imperial League (RSL today) and one penny was received by the government. Since that time red poppies have been worn on the anniversary of Armistice in Australia, officially named Remembrance Day since 1977.

LEST WE FORGET

Reading from the Book of Ruth Chapter 3, verse 1-3, Chapter 4 Verse 13-17

Naomi her mother-in-law said to her, 'My daughter, I need to seek some security for you, so that it may be well with you. Now here is our kinsman Boaz, with whose young women you have been working. See, he is winnowing barley tonight at the threshing-floor. Now wash and anoint yourself, and put on your best clothes and go down to the threshing-floor; but do not make yourself known to the man until he has finished eating and drinking. When he lies down, observe the place where he lies; then, go and uncover his feet and lie down; and he will tell you what to do.' She said to her, 'All that you tell me I will do.'

So Boaz took Ruth and she became his wife. When they came together, the LORD made her conceive, and she bore a son. Then the women said to Naomi, 'Blessed be the LORD, who has not left you this day without next-of-kin; and may his name be renowned in Israel! He shall be to you a restorer of life and a nourisher of your old age; for your daughter-in-law who loves you, who is more to you than seven sons, has borne him.' Then Naomi took the child and laid him in her bosom, and became his nurse. The women of the neighbourhood gave him a name, saying, 'A son has been born to Naomi.' They named him Obed; he became the father of Jesse, the father of David.

Unless the Lord builds the house: their labour is but lost that build it. Unless the Lord keeps the city: the watchmen watch in vain. It is in vain that you rise up early and go so late to rest, eating the bread of toil:

Like arrows in the hand of a warrior: are the children of one's youth. Happy the man who has his quiver full of them: he will not be put to shame when he confronts his enemies at the gate.

A Reading from the letter to the Hebrews Chapter 9, verses 23-28;

Thus it was necessary for the sketches of the heavenly things to be purified with these rites, but the heavenly things themselves need better sacrifices than these. For Christ did not enter a sanctuary made by human hands, a mere copy of the true one, but he entered into heaven itself, now to appear in the presence of God on our behalf. Nor was it to offer himself again and again, as the high priest enters the Holy Place year after year with blood that is not his own; for then he would have had to suffer again and again since the foundation of the world. But as it is, he has appeared once for all at the end of the age to remove sin by the sacrifice of himself. And just as it is appointed for mortals to die once, and after that the judgement, so Christ, having been offered once to bear the sins of many, will appear a second time, not to deal with sin, but to save those who are eagerly waiting for him.

The Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to St Mark, Chapter 12, verses 38-44.

As he taught, he said, 'Beware of the scribes, who like to walk around in long robes, and to be greeted with respect in the market-places, and to have the best seats in the synagogues and places of honour at banquets! They devour widows' houses and for the sake of appearance say long prayers. They will receive the greater condemnation.'

He sat down opposite the treasury, and watched the crowd putting money into the treasury. Many rich people put in large sums. A poor widow came and put in two small copper coins, which are worth a penny. Then he called his disciples and said to them, '*Truly I tell you, this poor widow has put in more than all those who are contributing to the treasury. For all of them have contributed out of their abundance; but she out of her poverty has put in everything she had, all she had to live on.*'

MISSION REPORT - 8th November 2015

ABM Big Thank you for Stamp Donations

ABM is very grateful to the many loyal supporters who have collected and donated stamps towards their fundraising.

Last month the Sydney Auxiliary meeting recognised and honoured Sr Rosamund Duncan for her tireless service to ABM in helping with the stamp donations which started 20 years ago. Sr Rosamund has been going to the Sydney Office and voluntarily sorting out stamps and taking them to the Sydney auction houses where they are sold to raise money for ABM's projects. Much of ABM's stamps find their way to Kennedy Stamps. The stamps are used in 'mission mixed packs.'

Just recently, Sydney Auxiliary President, Tricia Howard advised that from the period 2010-2015 a total sum of \$38,000 has been raised as a direct result of stamps.

ABM continues the practice of accepting stamps from loyal supporters from the Dioceses, on a regular basis. This represents millions of stamps, and hours of effort from a large number of Friends of ABM, who collect, cut, sort and sell. ABM also notes that they sometimes receive whole collections, and some prove to be very valuable when sold - a generous gift to ABM.

Please remember - to carefully trim stamps (leaving about 1cm of envelop on each side)

This is also important, as extra paper in bulk, equates to surplus and to extra mailing costs.

ABM would like to say A BIG THANK YOU to all our collectors and helpers for this tremendous effort and to encourage you all to keep collecting used stamps as **the money goes towards ABM's work in mission**.
