

A Reading from the Second Book of Samuel Chapter 6, verse 1 to 5 and 12b to 19

David again gathered all the chosen men of Israel, thirty thousand. David and all the people with him set out and went from Baale-judah, to bring up from there the ark of God, which is called by the name of the LORD of hosts who is enthroned on the cherubim. They carried the ark of God on a new cart, and brought it out of the house of Abinadab, which was on the hill. Uzzah and Ahio, the sons of Abinadab, were driving the new cart with the ark of God; and Ahio went in front of the ark. David and all the house of Israel were dancing before the LORD with all their might, with songs and lyres and harps and tambourines and castanets and cymbals.

So David went and brought up the ark of God from the house of Obed-edom to the city of David with rejoicing; and when those who bore the ark of the LORD had gone six paces, he sacrificed an ox and a fatling. David danced before the LORD with all his might; David was girded with a linen ephod. So David and all the house of Israel brought up the ark of the LORD with shouting, and with the sound of the trumpet.

As the ark of the LORD came into the city of David, Michal daughter of Saul looked out of the window, and saw King David leaping and dancing before the LORD; and she despised him in her heart.

They brought in the ark of the LORD, and set it in its place, inside the tent that David had pitched for it; and David offered burnt-offerings and offerings of well-being before the LORD. When David had finished offering the burnt-offerings and the offerings of well-being, he blessed the people in the name of the LORD of hosts, and distributed food among all the people, the whole multitude of Israel, both men and women, to each a cake of bread, a portion of meat, and a cake of raisins. Then all the people went back to their homes.

The Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ

according to St Mark, Chapter 6, verses 14-29

King Herod heard of it, for Jesus' name had become known. Some were saying, *'John the baptizer has been raised from the dead; and for this reason these powers are at work in him.'* But others said, *'It is Elijah.'* And others said, *'It is a prophet, like one of the prophets of old.'* But when Herod heard of it, he said, *'John, whom I beheaded, has been raised.'*

For Herod himself had sent men who arrested John, bound him, and put him in prison on account of Herodias, his brother Philip's wife, because Herod had married her. For John had been telling Herod, *'It is not lawful for you to have your brother's wife.'* And Herodias had a grudge against him, and wanted to kill him. But she could not, for Herod feared John, knowing that he was a righteous and holy man, and he protected him. When he heard him, he was greatly perplexed; and yet he liked to listen to him. But an opportunity came when Herod on his birthday gave a banquet for his courtiers and officers and for the leaders of Galilee. When his daughter Herodias came in and danced, she pleased Herod and his guests; and the king said to the girl, *'Ask me for whatever you wish, and I will give it.'* And he solemnly swore to her, *'Whatever you ask me, I will give you, even half of my kingdom.'* She went out and said to her mother, *'What should I ask for?'* She replied, *'The head of John the baptizer.'* Immediately she rushed back to the king and requested, *'I want you to give me at once the head of John the Baptist on a platter.'* The king was deeply grieved; yet out of regard for his oaths and for the guests, he did not want to refuse her. Immediately the king sent a soldier of the guard with orders to bring John's head. He went and beheaded him in the prison, brought his head on a platter, and gave it to the girl. Then the girl gave it to her mother. When his disciples heard about it, they came and took his body, and laid it in a tomb.

Mission Report – 12th July 2015.

MISSION TO SEAFARERS - SEA SUNDAY

“For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you gave me clothing, I was sick and you took care of me” Matthew 25: 35-36

The Mission to Seafarers was founded in 1856 and is entirely funded by voluntary donations. On Sea Sunday churches all over the world come together to remember seafarers and pray for them, their families and those who support them.

This is an opportunity to bring to mind the role of seafarers in keeping us supplied with many basic necessities of life and other consumer goods from around the world. Over 90% of the goods we purchase are transported by sea; that trade is reliant on the efforts of seafarers who undertake a dangerous task often in difficult circumstances. The Mission to Seafarers provides help and support to the 1.5 million men and women who face danger every day to keep our global economy afloat.

Newcastle is the largest and busiest coal port in the world. The Mission to Seafarers Centre in Newcastle is a significant outreach of the diocese, and is one of over 260 centres based in ports all over the world. The mission offers care for seafarers of all ranks, nationalities and beliefs, by offering practical, emotional and spiritual support through ship visits, drop-in centres and a range of welfare and emergency support services

The average size crew is twenty to twenty-two. As only a percentage of crews can come ashore, if any at all, there is a small ship-visiting team whose role is to go on-board as many vessels as possible, bearing gifts of magazines and novels...., hoping to spend some quality time with the captains. Because of the very short turn-around time captains and chief cooks rarely have time to go ashore. They love talking to anyone, especially about their families.

The Flying Angel /Stella Maris Seafarers’ Centre also provides a ‘home away from home’ for seafarers who may have been at sea for up to two years. They can enjoy time away from their ship and use internet and phone facilities to get in touch with loved ones whom they have been separated from for many months. There is also a Chapel for personal prayer, and services. At times services and prayer also take place onboard the ships, and this is important for those unable to go on shore leave. In an emergency, the ministry of Mission to Seafarers is often the only help on offer.

No matter what problem a seafarer is facing, be it injury, abandonment, non-payment of wages or personal difficulties, they know they can turn to the local Mission for help, advice and support. The chaplains and volunteers offer practical and financial support, advocacy services, family liaison or simply a space to talk in a time of crisis.

The Flying Angel Centre/Stella Maris Seafarers' Centre provide free transport, free internet, free clothing, free food, free entertainment, free pastoral care, free books/bibles/etc, free ship visiting, free hospital visits... and many more services. Donations of money, time, mens clothing, beanies, bibles and magazines are always welcome.

Mission To Seafarers Newcastle recognised.

The 2015 International Seafarers' Welfare Awards, showcasing excellence in the provision of seafarers' welfare. Mission included amongst the top five Seafarer Centres nominated. Importantly, the Seafarer Centre of the Year was **nominated directly by seafarers themselves.**

This is a great affirmation of the good work being done by the team of chaplains, Rev'd Canon Garry Dodd, Rev'd Peter Middleton (Anglican) and Rick McCosker (Catholic) and the team of volunteers at the Mission to Seafarers in Newcastle as they care for seafarers from around the world who visit our port. The Mission to Seafarers needs your prayers and support for all merchant crews and their families on Sea Sunday 2015, to continue the vital work for those in need.

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Some thoughts on Matthew 5.1 to 16

The Sermon on the Mount otherwise known as the Beatitudes

^{5.1} When Jesus saw the crowds, he went up the mountain; and after he sat down, his disciples came to him. ² Then he began to speak, and taught them, saying:

³ 'Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.

⁴ 'Blessed are those who mourn, for they will be comforted.

⁵ 'Blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the earth.

⁶ 'Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they will be filled.

⁷ 'Blessed are the merciful, for they will receive mercy.

⁸ 'Blessed are the pure in heart, for they will see God.

⁹ 'Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God

¹⁰ 'Blessed are those who are persecuted for righteousness' sake, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.

¹¹ 'Blessed are you when people revile you and persecute you and utter all kinds of evil against you falsely on my account. ¹² Rejoice and be glad, for your reward is great in heaven, for in the same way they persecuted the prophets who were before you.

Salt and Light

¹³ **'You are the salt of the earth;** but if salt has lost its taste, how can its saltiness be restored? It is no longer good for anything, but is thrown out and trampled underfoot.

¹⁴ **'You are the light of the world.** A city built on a hill cannot be hidden. ¹⁵ No one after lighting a lamp puts it under the bushel basket, but on the lamp stand, and it gives light to all in the house.

¹⁶In the same way, let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father in heaven."

The Beatitudes, Parish Planning and Christian Character

*Quoted below is material written as part of the emerging parish planning process. Therein is an attempt to explore the meaning of the Sermon on the Mount as it may provide appropriate Biblical warrant for our **parish identity, vision and our concomitant values and practices**. The notion of the Beatitudes as being instructive ethically, liturgically and prayerfully is affirmed in the exegetical work by Charles Talbert (*The Paideia Commentary Series on the Gospel of St Matthew*). Of particular interest is Talbert's further arguments for the possibility that the Beatitudes are principally directed to the pivotal matter of **character building in "imitation" of Jesus**.*

"It may generally be agreed that our Lord's teachings, commonly known as **"The Sermon on the Mount"** or **"The Beatitudes"**, considered alongside the **"Two Great Commandments"** and **"The Lord's Prayer"**, provide fertile ground for arguing the basis for **Christian ethical values and instruction in worship and prayer**. For example, if we are living faithfully according to the Dominical command to love neighbour as we have been loved, or to love others as we love self, then we are called to **value peacemaking and to repudiate and act against all that degrades or destroys others**.

Another perspective for the possible role of the Beatitudes, alongside ethical standards, has been discussed by Biblical scholar Charles H. Talbert, in the **Paideia Commentary Series on the Gospel of St Matthew** [Baker Publisher, Grand Rapid, Michigan, 2010]. Talbert writes in some detail on this matter on pages 96 to 106 of the aforementioned Paideia commentary. He begins his considerations by asking whether the **Sermon on the Mount** is primarily concerned with ethics and asserting that *"this is a common understanding"*.

However Talbert goes on to argue that the Beatitudes do not just contain ethical instruction but also instruction in worship and prayer, referencing scholar John Richs. And then Talbert highlights yet another critical dimension, that is... **"the Sermon on the Mount functions primarily as a catalyst for the formation of identity or character. Only in a secondary way can it serve as a contributor to the task of decision-making. The ethical material contained in the Sermon is directed not in the first instance to decision-making but rather the formation of moral character..."**

Talbert argues his case in detail. He contends that the Beatitudes do *not* contain norms or rules or laws to guide an ethical decision-making process. **Dilemma-based ethics are reactive. Rather he describes the dimension which he refers to as character formation thus...**

"What exactly *is* meant by character formation? Character and identity may be regarded as interchangeable terms. The chief elements in character or identity are **perceptions** (*how one sees things*), **dispositions** (*persisting attitudes that flow from the overarching orientation or vision*), and **intentions** (*deliberately chosen or self-conscious activity, motivation*).

If the Sermon on the Mount is designed for **character formation, it will facilitate a new way of seeing life - seeing the world with eyes that are Christ-like**, issuing in new dispositions and intentions/motivations. **Character ethics then are proactive.** There are, therefore, two questions to distinguish. *First*, what is a disciple **to be** (virtue ethics). *Second*, what is a disciple of Jesus **to do** (Dilemma ethics). The first is a question of character or identity; the second is a question decision-making to enable proper action."

Talbert goes on to argue that the First Evangelist distinguishes between **being** and **doing**. For example, he distinguishes between tree and fruit (Mtt 17.16-18; 12.33), heart and mouth (12.24; 15.18-19); being and speaking (12.34) and person and things (12.3).

As it happens Talbert makes a comparison which seems to speak directly to our parish statements of Identity and Vision. "In Matt 5.14-16 the distinction is expressed as...

"You are the light of the world..." (character/identity) *and*
"Let your light shine..." (behaviour/action)

That is, act in accordance with your nature; let your actions reflect your character. Be imitators of Christ [1 Corinthians 11:1]"

With respect to our draft Parish Plan, containing a **Statement of Identity** (We are the Body of Christ, His Spirit is with us) and a **Statement of Vision** (We desire to shine as one in Christ that God's will be done) it follows that we seek to be very intentional, under God, and in the gift of God's Holy Spirit, to develop and implement strategic planning based upon our deeply held aspirations as to identity and vision and the values and practices which follow logically.

Who we commit to **be** directs how we behave. **Who we truly are defines what we do (and therefore what we do mirrors who we truly are)**. As our Christian character develops under God, as we faithfully yearn to be in Christ as Christ is in us, then our ethical choices and daily behaviours become an unthinking, deeply embedded practice ...**we can do no other and are deeply troubled by sin until we find forgiveness**. Whereas the Christian character is "a Spirit-led imitation of Christ", conversely, patterned behaviour which is subconsciously *divisive and destructive, mean-spirited and separating, self-serving and dishonest, hypocritical and malicious* cannot be of Christ but characteristic of different groundings. It would seem that an essential burden of Talbert's argument is that the Beatitudes heard and internalized build a Christ-like character. Thus shaped, then our character being formed begets our daily behaviour and moral values...so our continuing parish focus on identity and vision!"

The Pastoral Care Committee Initiatives

The **Parish Pastoral Care Committee** meets **every month on the 2nd Thursday at 10.00am**. The Parish Contact Book

In recent times the Committee has been working on two projects. The first is the development of the second edition of the **Parish Contact Book**. The Pastoral Care Committee noted, with deep gratitude, the enormous amount of work of the Parish Office team under the leadership of Bev Broadley.

Regarding this project the objective is that all who choose to participate can have access to the personal contact details of other parishioners. This seems a very significant and healthy circumstance to promote communications within our faith community; to facilitate relational connection rather than separation. Notwithstanding, it is understood that sharing personal contact details must be managed sensitively and that is appropriate to ensure that the Parish Contact Book is an in-house document only for the use of all who have given permission for the publication of personal contact details and who thus choose to share. Parishioners are warmly invited to discuss this matter with the Rector.

A Parish Link Programme

The Pastoral Care Committee has negotiated a programme which aims to help the parish to stay in touch with parishioners, especially in times of need.

First, leaders of the many parish groups, as well as representatives from our worship groups, are being asked to establish a contact network within each group so that there is awareness of and intention to stay in touch when individual members aren't able to gather. It is about really caring for each other, especially when our normal points of contact can't happen - for example, at times of prolonged illness or circumstantial isolation.

Secondly, parishioners are asked to share with the Rector at times of need so that our parish can support each other according to need. This invitation is important where parishioners may not be part of an existing network. This initiative is designed to maximise inclusivity and will be supported with the establishment of a parish prayer chain to pray with intention as requested. *BG*
