## A Reading from the Second Book of Samuel Chapter 11, verses 1 to 15

In the spring of the year, the time when kings go out to battle, David sent Joab with his officers and all Israel with him; they ravaged the Ammonites, and besieged Rabbah. But David remained at Jerusalem.

It happened, late one afternoon, when David rose from his couch and was walking about on the roof of the king's house, that he saw from the roof a woman bathing; the woman was very beautiful. David sent someone to inquire about the woman. It was reported, '*This is Bathsheba daughter of Eliam, the wife of Uriah the Hittite.*' So David sent messengers to fetch her, and she came to him, and he lay with her. (Now she was purifying herself after her period.) Then she returned to her house. The woman conceived; and she sent and told David, 'I am pregnant.'

So David sent word to Joab, 'Send me Uriah the Hittite.' And Joab sent Uriah to David. When Uriah came to him, David asked how Joab and the people fared, and how the war was going. Then David said to Uriah, 'Go down to your house, and wash your feet.' Uriah went out of the king's house, and there followed him a present from the king. But Uriah slept at the entrance of the king's house with all the servants of his lord, and did not go down to his house.

When they told David, 'Uriah did not go down to his house', David said to Uriah, 'You have just come from a journey. Why did you not go down to your house?' Uriah said to David, 'The ark and Israel and Judah remain in booths; and my lord Joab and the servants of my lord are camping in the open field; shall I then go to my house, to eat and to drink, and to lie with my wife? As you live, and as your soul lives, I will not do such a thing.' Then David said to Uriah, 'Remain here today also, and tomorrow I will send you back.' So Uriah remained in Jerusalem that day. On the next day, David invited him to eat and drink in his presence and made him drunk; and in the evening he went out to lie on his couch with the servants of his lord, but he did not go down to his house.

In the morning David wrote a letter to Joab, and sent it by the hand of Uriah. In the letter he wrote, 'Set Uriah in the forefront of the hardest fighting, and then draw back from him, so that he may be struck down and die.'

## The Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to St John, Chapter 6, verses 1 to 21

After this Jesus went to the other side of the Sea of Galilee, also called the Sea of Tiberias. A large crowd kept following him, because they saw the signs that he was doing for the sick. Jesus went up the mountain and sat down there with his disciples. Now the Passover, the festival of the Jews, was near. When he looked up and saw a large crowd coming towards him, Jesus said to Philip, 'Where are we to buy bread for these people to eat?' He said this to test him, for he himself knew what he was going to do. Philip answered him, 'Six months' wages would not buy enough bread for each of them to get a little.' One of his disciples, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, said to him,

'There is a boy here who has five barley loaves and two fish. But what are they among so many people?'

Jesus said, 'Make the people sit down.' Now there was a great deal of grass in the place; so they sat down, about five thousand in all. Then Jesus took the loaves, and when he had given thanks, he distributed them to those who were seated; so also the fish, as much as they wanted.

When they were satisfied, he told his disciples, '**Gather up the fragments left over, so that nothing may be lost.'** So they gathered them up, and from the fragments of the five barley loaves, left by those who had eaten, they filled twelve baskets. When the people saw the sign that he had done, they began to say, 'This is indeed the prophet who is to come into the world.'

When Jesus realized that they were about to come and take him by force to make him king, he withdrew again to the mountain by himself.

When evening came, his disciples went down to the lake, got into a boat, and started across the lake to Capernaum. It was now dark, and Jesus had not yet come to them. The lake became rough because a strong wind was blowing. When they had rowed about three or four miles, they saw Jesus walking on the lake and coming near the boat, and they were terrified. But he said to them, 'It is I; do not be afraid.' Then they wanted to take him into the boat, and immediately the boat reached the land towards which they were going.

## From the Rector

As my retirement comes closer I seek to leave the parish with some archival material which may be a helpful record of the some of the realities and outcomes of our ministries together since 2011. In these records are some of the plans which have been openly promulgated and partially undertaken – partially given that no plan is perfectly fulfilled and every plan underway is always an imperfect, dynamic and changing phenomenon.

I think it must be stressed at this point that the material to which I am referring has at no point be promoted as authoritative, mandatory, directive or complete but rather, and hopefully, as helpful, exploratory, indicative, intentionally Biblebased and part of a conversation which can assist the parish **to have a clearer sense of identity and direction and purpose**.

In particular I do believe that we have been, over the last year or so, constantly aware of the hoped-for parish **identity** and **vision** which shapes **the draft parish plan** and which appears on the cover page of the weekly parish bulletin.

### The records to which I refer in particular include...

- The Draft Parish Plan
- Some Observations on the Parish of Terrigal July 2015
  - The Rector's Report to the AGM 2014
  - The Rector's Report to the AGM 2015

At this time in the parish's journey it may be that the archival material abovementioned may support the process wherein the parish can accurately consider its past, and the realities of the now, whilst waiting upon God's guidance into the future which is His and into which He calls this dynamic and optimistic faith community.

Copies of the Draft Parish Plan will be available for parishioners at this Sunday's Eucharists and thereafter from the sideboard adjacent to the door of the audio-visual control room.

To follow is a section of the document headed - **Some Observations on the Parish of Terrigal – July 2015.** I have written this article as I have considered my experience seeking to serve the parish as rector and thus reflecting upon some significant times and events which I have shared with this faith community.

#### From the Rector - continued

The section quoted below contains some thoughts which I have regarded as a pivotal Scriptural underpinning for the business of the parish – indeed **our core business informed by the very essence of the Christian character...** 

"In consideration of my endeavours to **affirm and promote** a healthy Christlike culture in the parish, I have sought **to explicate**, **exemplify and call** parishioners to relationships and moral choices according to the Biblical attested dynamics of <u>righteousness</u>, <u>justice</u> and <u>mercy</u> - consistently prophesied in the Old Testament and perfected in Jesus.

This Biblical treasure demands a commitment to our prior relationship with God which renders healing and life and then, bearing the fruits of our divine/human identity, to evince ethical behaviour which typically values truth and grace and seeks out the lonely and anxious, the abused and persecuted, the imprisoned, atrophied and marginalised - so that all vulnerable relationships and all whose lives and beings are at risk might be healed and made whole in Christ.

In this context I believe that the notion of **God's justice**, Biblically revealed, is not a matter of forensic analysis, transactional contracts or retribution. Rather, God's justice derives from the capacity, nature and will of God, sublimely revealed in the compassionate work of Jesus, to acknowledge when we are at risk and to heal, that is **to make whole**; to save; to render new life!

Where we are wounded; where our capacity is atrophied and potential compromised; where we are at risk, then God's justice is about His addressing the cause(s), to effect true wholeness of being. God's merciful response to 'injustice', is healing and hope, announced passionately on the cross of Christ. And Jesus acts thus because his loving nature means that He can do no other! He was demonstrably not simply a showman craving attention and status (a common phenomenon in the ancient world) but Jesus was a man of integrity, truly as one with the wounded and separated. I believe that our ultimate destiny, even through the grave, and in penitence and faith, is perfect healing, human/divine immersion to be one with Christ. The glory of God is man (sic) fully alive. [St Irenaeus of Lyon - 2<sup>nd</sup> Century].

This Bible-based, theological dynamic (truth, righteousness, justice and mercy) which is perfectly realized and shared in Jesus, must be constantly named, intentionally pursued, deliberately embraced and critically evaluated. Paramountly these matters are not just a noble goal but core business and the very essence of Christian ministry! They go to our identity and cultural experience as the Body of Christ and individually members of it!

In God may we grow into that Christ-like identity and character such that we can be no other than to "do justice, love mercy and walk humbly with God" [Micah 6]! - God's blessing in this life.

The call to aspire to understand, to yearn for and to grow towards Christlike healing behaviour is reflected in my 2014 and 2015 AGM Reports. In particular, I have asked and encouraged parishioners to own our Christian identity as the Body of Christ and our subsequent challenge to be gracious and generous of spirit and to understand that any division within and breaching of relationships is antithetical to our identity as the Body of Christ. It is unjust and must be addressed when it occurs! Given our Christian identity and consequent character it makes no sense to serve self, to lust for power and status, nor to bully, lie, abuse or atrophy.

Thus it follows that it is contradictory and offensive to act in self-serving ways, especially in pursuit of personal power and influence and most particularly when such behaviours causes pain, suffering and injustice to others; when they atrophy the dignity and growth of our neighbours; and give no honour to the nature, will and sovereignty of God. They are the converse of God's nature and truth and His eternal call to righteousness, justice and mercy. I ponder when such unjust behaviours become blasphemous!

Specifically in terms of parish ministry, growing towards a Christ-like identity which repudiates deception, injustice, dishonesty and unrighteousness, I believe this means naming and encouraging a culture built relationally under God. Prayerfully, our ethical heart and responses ought then be a natural and co-existent corollary. <u>In Christ we can do no other</u>!"

## Sermon Material - Mark 6.30-34, 53-56

#### Feeding the Five Thousand

<sup>6.30</sup> The apostles gathered around Jesus, and told him all that they had done and taught. <sup>31</sup>He said to them, 'Come away to a deserted place all by yourselves and rest a while.' For many were coming and going, and they had no leisure even to eat. <sup>32</sup>And they went away in the boat to a deserted place by themselves. <sup>33</sup>Now many saw them going and recognized them, and they hurried there on foot from all the towns and arrived ahead of them. <sup>34</sup>As he went ashore, he saw a great crowd; and he had compassion for them, because they were like sheep without a shepherd; and he began to teach them many things.

#### Healing the Sick in Gennesaret

<sup>6.53</sup> When they had crossed over, they came to land at Gennesaret and moored the boat. <sup>54</sup>When they got out of the boat, people at once recognized him, <sup>55</sup>and rushed about that whole region and began to bring the sick on mats to wherever they heard he was. <sup>56</sup>And wherever he went, into villages or cities or farms, they laid the sick in the market-places, and begged him that they might touch even the fringe of his cloak; and all who touched it were healed.

#### **Reflections upon the Markan Gospel – Chapter 6**

6.30 - The apostles gathered around Jesus, and told him all that they had done and taught.
 <sup>31</sup>He said to them, 'Come away to a deserted place all by yourselves and rest a while.'

The Common Lectionary, which we follow Sunday by Sunday, has directed us to the Markan Gospel and the writer's account of the sufferings of Jesus. He is rejected by his own people in Nazareth {Mark 6.1-6]. Then He goes among the vilages teaching and sends out his disciples to proclaim the Gospel, to call people to repentance and to exorcise and heal. And He gives some important advice which was to serve them in their apostolate and, in due course, us in our own ministry - when we are rejected in our ministries...do not carry the guilt of others, nor be overwhelmed by prejudice, nor accept responsibilities for the decisions of others. Be true to God and His gospel, and move on!

After this episode in chapter 6 of Mark we read of the macabre death of John the Baptist. Whereas the disciple's missionary experiences at this stage seem unremarkable, or at least little is attested, the cutting-edge ministries of both Jesus and John the Baptist have generated rejection and indeed hostility Following Mark's account of the beheading of John the Baptist Mark introduces the miracle of the feeding of the five thousand which includes the first section of the the extract for Ordinary Sunday 16 (as above). This introduction takes up from the return of the apostles from their missionary "apprenticeship". It is instructive that the setting for what follows is the rejection of Jesus in Nazareth, that Jesus and his disciples are in the region of Nazareth, that he calls his disciples into a deserted place and that a crowd of curious Nazarenes follow from a distance. The following material is drawn from John J. Pilch's The Cultural World of Jesus [The Liturgical Press, Collegeville Minnesota, 1996 – pp112-115)

Consider the situation. In 1<sup>st</sup> Century Palestine there were only three of four cities the size of Jerusalem.

By contrast Nazareth was a population of somewhere between 50 to 150 people. In these times small communities cared for each other; but this also meant your business as everybody's and everybody knows your business. Privacy was an issue!

**And so** – <sup>31</sup>[Jesus] said to them, 'Come away to a deserted place all by yourselves and rest a while. For many were coming and going, and they had no leisure even to eat.

Jesus wanted to spend some quite time with his disciples and TO SHARE A MEAL. So he invited them to come away to a deserted place, In the New Testament the Greek word translated as a 'deserted place' meant an UNINHABITED PLACE, probably remote.

Jesus wanted to share a meal with his disciples after a time of separation during which the disciples exercised mission under his authority. And in ancient Palestinian times a meal was no superficial experience – contrarily, meals were leisurely **AND THE RENEWAL AND STRENGTHENING OF BONDS**.

#### JESUS VALUED AND CREATED OPPORTUNTIES FOR DEEPENING RELATIONSHIPS.

#### Sermon Material - Mark 6.30-34, 53-56 - continued

<sup>33</sup>Now many saw them going and recognized them, and they hurried there on foot from all the towns and arrived ahead of them.

In the small rural communities of Bible times such communuities were deeply interwoven and many were very aware of the comings and goings of others. And so when the recently rejected Jesus was seen leaving with his disciples to go into a "deserted place" curiosities were aroused...what did this disrespected man want with his disciples? why did they seek solitude? what nefarious activities might they be engaging in? Many followed!

And so - a large crowd ended up in this deserted place

<sup>34</sup>As [Jesus] went ashore, he saw a great crowd; and **he had compassion** for them, because they were like sheep without a shepherd; and he began to teach them many things.

# J. Pilch observes "The HBW word compassion' derives from the word for 'womb'....The term was considered a female value and virtue."

As Jesus beholds this crowd in the deserted place he sees vulnerable men and women now afar from their kin and the securities of village and home. He sees humankind in pursuit of who knows what taking riks with their own well-being. Indeed in ancient times deserted places were often believed to be the lairs of vagabonds and criminal and even demons and evil spirits. Yet despite their follies and because they were at risk and vulnerable ....JESUS, FROM THE DEPTHS OF HIS PERSONAL CHARACTER EMBRACES THE PEOPLE AS A MOTHER EMBRACES HER CHILDREN - PROTECTING, CARING...SAVING...FOR HE CAN DO NO OTHER. In well rehearsed Biblical terms he is righteous, just and merciful.

He extravagantly embraces the relationship which he feels for humanity and his nature which is to be where we are at risk – even though we often take ourselves to that place for the least of reasons – and he overwhelms that which would ultimately degrade and destroy us. He embraces us in the Godgiven womb of new beginnings

Jesus miraculously feeds the crowd; he strengthens their bonds; he recognizes their needs and meets them – see Mark 6.53ff and this prefigured the insititution of the Lord's supper and God's nurture, protection and rebirth in crucifixion, resurrection, and the indwelling of the Holy Spirit.

## MISSION REPORT – 26<sup>th</sup> JULY 2015

### **Mission to Seafarers**

On Wednesday 15<sup>th</sup> July, I drove up to Newcastle to visit the Mission to Seafarers centre.

I was very warmly welcomed by Meryl McCosker, who is the wife of the Catholic Chaplain, Rick McCosker. Meryl gave me a tour of the centre. The outdoor area, has had a beautiful mural painted onto the neighbouring concrete brick wall, enhancing the area, and making it a far more appealing and restful area for people to enjoy. There is also a sorting area, where the books and magazines are bundled together, in readiness to be taken to the ships.

Two volunteers come to the centre each week to prepare meals which can be frozen, so that meals are always readily available.

The Chapel is currently undergoing renovations, with assistance through the skills training/work for the dole benefits scheme. This is progressing slowly.

The centre was very much in need of beanies, and Meryl immediately placed one bag of beanies straight into the receptacle at the centre. Chaplains Rick McCosker and Garry Dodd thanked the parish for their tremendous response to our Beanie Appeal. They inquired about how our parish had promoted the mission.

The beanies are also distributed all year round, and especially at Christmas time, they are part of a Christmas gift, which those visiting the boats will take with them in a bag which has a beanie, men's toiletries, magazine, book, pen, socks, etc.....to each of the seafarers.

# The centre is currently in need of men's warm clothing, and also seek magazines and books as well, and beanies.

It was good to know just how much the centre appreciates the generosity of our parishioners, and the parishioners from the other church centres throughout the Diocese.

Once again, a very big thank you to all who contributed to the wonderful response to the Mission to Seafarers this year.
