

**A Reading from St. Paul's letter to the Galatians
Chapter 6; verses 1-18.**

My friends, if anyone is detected in a transgression, you who have received the Spirit should restore such a one in a spirit of gentleness. Take care that you yourselves are not tempted. Bear one another's burdens, and in this way you will fulfil the law of Christ. For if those who are nothing think they are something, they deceive themselves. All must test their own work; then that work, rather than their neighbour's work, will become a cause for pride. For all must carry their own loads.

Those who are taught the word must share in all good things with their teacher.

Do not be deceived; God is not mocked, for you reap whatever you sow. If you sow to your own flesh, you will reap corruption from the flesh; but if you sow to the Spirit, you will reap eternal

life from the Spirit. So let us not grow weary in doing what is right, for we will reap at harvest time, if we do not give up. So then, whenever we have an opportunity, let us work for the good of all, and especially for those of the family of faith.

See what large letters I make when I am writing in my own hand! It is those who want to make a good showing in the flesh that try to compel you to be circumcised—only that they may not be persecuted for the cross of Christ. Even the circumcised do not themselves obey the law, but they want you to be circumcised so that they may boast about your flesh. May I never boast of anything except the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, by which the world has been crucified to me, and I to the world. For neither circumcision nor uncircumcision is anything; but a new creation is everything! As for those who will follow this rule—peace be upon them, and mercy, and upon the Israel of God.

From now on, let no one make trouble for me; for I carry the marks of Jesus branded on my body.

May the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ be with your spirit, brothers and sisters. Amen.

The Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to St Luke, Chapter 10; verses 1-12,17-24

After this the Lord appointed seventy others and sent them on ahead of him in pairs to every town and place where he himself intended to go. He said to them, 'The harvest is plentiful, but

the labourers are few; therefore ask the Lord of the harvest to send out labourers into his harvest. Go on your way. See, I am sending you out like lambs into the midst of wolves. Carry no purse, no bag, no sandals; and greet no one on the road. Whatever house you enter, first say, "Peace to this house!" And if anyone is there who shares in peace, your peace will rest on that person; but if not, it will return to you. Remain in the same house, eating and drinking whatever they provide, for the labourer deserves to be paid. Do not move about from house to house. Whenever you enter a town and its people welcome you, eat what is set before you; cure the sick who are there, and say to them, "The kingdom of God has come near to you." But whenever you enter a town and they do not welcome you, go out into its streets and say, "Even the dust of your town that clings to our feet, we wipe off in protest against you. Yet know this: the kingdom of God has come near." I tell you, on that day it will be more tolerable for Sodom than for that town.

The seventy returned with joy, saying, 'Lord, in your name even the demons submit to us!' He said to them, 'I watched Satan fall from heaven like a flash of lightning. See, I have given you authority to tread on snakes and scorpions, and over all the power of the enemy; and nothing will hurt you. Nevertheless, do not rejoice at this, that the spirits submit to you, but rejoice that your names are written in heaven.'

At that same hour Jesus rejoiced in the Holy Spirit and said, 'I thank you, Father, Lord of heaven and earth, because you have hidden these things from the wise and the intelligent and have revealed them to infants; yes, Father, for such was your gracious will. All things have been handed over to me by my Father; and no one knows who the Son is except the Father, or who the Father is except the Son and anyone to whom the Son chooses to reveal him.'

Then turning to the disciples, Jesus said to them privately, 'Blessed are the eyes that see what you see! For I tell you that many prophets and kings desired to see what you see, but did not see it, and to hear what you hear, but did not hear it.'

FROM THE RECTOR

BE STILL – THE NEED FOR SILENCE

A number of parishioners have spoken to me about the level of noise before and during the services. In our liturgies we pray, we sing, we hear readings and sermons – all involving noise.

There are times for noise and times for silence. The Book of Ecclesiastes says, there is “a time to keep silence and a time to speak” (3:7b). Our noise is to be purposeful: “Make a joyful noise to the Lord, all the earth. Worship the LORD with gladness; come into his presence with singing (Psalm 100:1, 2).” “Be still, and know that I am God!” (Psalm 46:10a). Our noise is directed to the praise of God, not to our neighbour in idle chatter.

Noise can be nothing more than a cover-up for our discomfort with silence. Silence is awkward. We fill it with noise because it threatens us. Pentecostal Pastor **David Sanistevan**, from Allison Park Church in Pittsburgh, Pa. USA, has written: “I can’t help but contrast our loud, high-energy worship services with Scriptures like this:

‘Be still and know that I am God. I will be exalted among the nations. I will be exalted in the earth’ (Ps. 46:10).

‘Do not be quick with your mouth, do not be hasty in your heart to utter anything before God. God is in heaven and you are on earth, so let your words be few’ (Eccl. 5:2).

“I’m not opposed to high-energy, loud worship services. I create them.

“At the same time, our houses of worship should be a sanctuary of rest from the noise we experience every day.

“Our worship shouldn’t contribute to the noise, but assist us in hearing the voice of our Maker.

“God sometimes speaks in the dynamic, but oftentimes it’s a whisper” (David Sanistevan *What Worship Leaders Ought To Know . . . About Silence In Corporate Worship* <https://thinkingworship.com>).

Think of Elijah on the mountain hearing the voice of God, not in the earthquake and fire, but “a sound of sheer silence” (1 Kings 19:12).

Former Archbishop of Canterbury, Rowan Williams has written, “Any culture which is terrified – as ours is – of silence and aloneness is one in which the sense

of human reality, human truth, is being eroded" (Rowan Williams *Open to Judgement: Sermons and Addresses* p. 147).

When we enter the house of God, where are our thoughts and where is the focus of our attention? **Attentiveness** to the presence of God and to those around us; being sensitive to those who may be trying to pray, can serve to still our hearts, minds and bodies.

Particular periods of sacred silence are observed at the Eucharist after the sermon and after receiving Holy Communion, as a sign of openness to receiving the grace of God in Word and Sacrament.
