Reading from the book of Genesis Chapter 2: Verses 15-17; 3.1-7.

The LORD God took the man and put him in the garden of Eden to till it and keep it. ¹⁶And the LORD God commanded the man, 'You may freely eat of every tree of the garden; ¹⁷but of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil you shall not eat, for in the day that you eat of it you shall die.'

Now the serpent was more crafty than any other wild animal that the LORD God had made. He said to the woman, 'Did God say, "You shall not eat from any tree in the garden"?' ²The woman said to the serpent, 'We may eat of the fruit of the trees in the garden; ³but God said, "You shall not eat of the fruit of the tree that is in the middle of the garden, nor shall you touch it, or you shall die." ⁴But the serpent said to the woman, 'You will not die; ⁵for God knows that when you eat of it your eyes will be opened, and you will be like God, knowing good and evil.' ⁶So when the woman saw that the tree was good for food, and that it was a delight to the eyes, and that the tree was to be desired to make one wise, she took of its fruit and ate; and she also gave some to her husband, who was with her, and he ate. ⁷Then the eyes of both were opened, and they knew that they were naked; and they sewed fig leaves together and made loincloths for themselves.

Blessed are those whose sin is forgiven: whose iniquity is put away.

Blessed are those to whom the Lord imputes no blame: and in whose spirit there is no guile.

For whilst I held my tongue: my bones wasted away with my daily complaining.

Your hand was heavy upon me day and night: and my moisture was dried up like a drought in summer.

Then I acknowledged my sin to you: and my iniquity I did not hide; I said 'I will confess my transgressions to the Lord': and so you forgave the wickedness of my sin.

For this cause shall everyone that is faithful make their prayer to you in the day of trouble: and in the time of the great water-flood, it shall not come near them.

You are a place to hide me in, you will preserve me from trouble: you will surround me with deliverance on every side.

'I will instruct you, and direct you in the way that you should go:

I will fasten my eye upon you, and give you counsel.

'Be not like horse or mule, that have no understanding: whose forward course must be curbed with bit and bridle.'

Great tribulations remain for the ungodly: but whoever puts their trust in the Lord, mercy embraces them on every side. **Rejoice in the Lord, you righteous, and be glad: and shout for joy, all you that are true of heart.**

A Reading from the letter of Paul to the Romans, Chapter 5. 12 - 21.

Therefore, just as sin came into the world through one man, and death came through sin, and so death spread to all because all have sinned— sin was indeed in the world before the law, but sin is not reckoned when there is no law. Yet death exercised dominion from Adam to Moses, even over those whose sins were not like the transgression of Adam, who is a type of the one who was to come.

But the free gift is not like the trespass. For if the many died through the one man's trespass, much more surely have the grace of God and the free gift in the grace of the one man, Jesus Christ, abounded for the many. And the free gift is not like the effect of the one man's sin. For the judgement following one trespass brought condemnation, but the free gift following many trespasses brings justification. If, because of the one man's trespass, death exercised dominion through that one, much more surely will those who receive the abundance of grace and the free gift of righteousness exercise dominion in life through the one man, Jesus Christ.

Therefore just as one man's trespass led to condemnation for all, so one man's act of righteousness leads to justification and life for all. For just as by the one man's disobedience the many were made sinners, so by the one man's obedience the many will be made righteous. But law came in, with the result that the trespass multiplied; but where sin increased, grace abounded all the more, so that, just as sin exercised dominion in death, so grace might also exercise dominion through justification leading to eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Then Jesus was led up by the Spirit into the wilderness to be tempted by the devil. He fasted for forty days and forty nights, and afterwards he was famished. SIGNS OF HOPE - POPE ATTENDS ANGLICAN CHURCH IN ROME

Last Sunday Pope Francis attended a service at All Saints' Anglican Church in Rome. The visit marked the 200th anniversary of the All Saints' church. The Pope said, "As Catholics and Anglicans, we are humbly grateful that, after centuries of mutual mistrust, we are now able to recognize that the fruitful grace of Christ is at work also in others," the pope said in his sermon. "Today we can be encouraged by our gathering."

Last October he attended a special service in Rome with Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby, to mark the 50th anniversary of the historic meeting between then Archbishop Michael Ramsey and Pope Paul VI.

With so much news of division and conflict, we can take hope and encouragement for the breaking down of old barriers and growth in mutual respect and understanding.

LENT – SEEING LIGHT IN THE DARKNESS

Lent is a reminder that not all of life is light and happiness. Both light and darkness are part and parcel of life. When life is all light or all darkness we suffer. A life full of light and free of darkness is a life of denial. A life full of darkness and devoid of light is a life of despair. No life is really all one or the other. Light and darkness repeatedly interplay in our lives.

American Benedictine Sister and writer on spirituality Joan Chittister says, "being able to read the languages of light and dark around us, knowing which we are seeing when, is a cultivated spiritual art. It is the difference between being spiritually mature and being a spiritual child, between being wholly alive and only partially alive" ('Light in the Darkness' *The Tablet* 21 February 2015, p. 15).

She directs us to the great mystics who were lost in the presence of God and could rejoice even in the midst of life's darkest periods. One example she refers to is Edith Stein, who was born into a Jewish family, turned to atheism in her teenage years, then became a nursing assistant in response to the horrors of Word War I. She completed her doctoral thesis and obtained an assistantship at the University of Freiburg. After reading the works of St Teresa of Avila, she was drawn to the Christian faith. She eventually became a Carmelite nun and was finally sent to Auschwitz and died in the gas chambers. She was later canonized as St Teresa Benedicta of the Cross. It was a sense of the Divine Light that gave her the strength to face the darkness of death at the hands of the Nazis.

Jesus went into the desert to prepare for his public ministry. He was surrounded by wild beasts, heat, hunger and thirst, loneliness and temptation. Yet Jesus resisted the enticements of Satan and refused the offer of a cheap and easy life. He opted for spiritual maturity instead of spiritual childishness. Only through commitment to Jesus himself can we walk in the light. As Joan Chittister says, "Surely, as followers of Jesus, we need to do the same: to see the light in him and follow it ourselves."
