What then are we to say was gained by Abraham, our ancestor according to the flesh? For if Abraham was justified by works, he has something to boast about, but not before God. For what does the scripture say? 'Abraham believed God, and it was reckoned to him as righteousness.' Now to one who works, wages are not reckoned as a gift but as something due. But to one who without works trusts him who justifies the ungodly, such faith is reckoned as righteousness. For the promise that he would inherit the world did not come to Abraham or to his descendants through the law but through the righteousness of faith. If it is the adherents of the law who are to be the heirs, faith is null and the promise is void. For the law brings wrath; but where there is no law, neither is there violation. For this reason it depends on faith, in order that the promise may rest on grace and be guaranteed to all his descendants, not only to the adherents of the law but also to those who share the faith of Abraham (for he is the father of all of us, as it is written, 'I have made you the father of many nations')—in the presence of the God in whom he believed, who gives life to the dead and calls into existence the things that do not exist.

GUIDANCE ON RECEIVING COMMUNION - CORONAVIRUS (COVID-19)

Coronavirus (COVID-19) is a respiratory illness with symptoms ranging from a mild cough to pneumonia. Some people recover easily, others may get sick very quickly. The Australian Government does not identify a risk for the Australian population unless someone has been in mainland China or been in close contact with someone who has a confirmed case of the virus.

Good hygiene practices prevent the spread of infection, including:

- Washing your hands often with soap and water
- Using a tissue to cover your mouth when you cough or sneeze
- Avoiding close contact with others, such as touching

Churches have been advised to follow best-hygiene practices. If you have a cough or sneeze you are advised to refrain from handshaking during the Greeting of Peace.

Priests presiding at the Altar and Chalice Assistants will wash their hands with an alcohol-based hand sanitiser. Communion vessels (chalice, paten and ciborium) are scalded with boiling water before use at each Eucharist.

If you have an infection, please receive only the Host in Holy Communion and refrain from receiving the Chalice. To receive Communion under the species of bread alone is still a valid communion.

Intinction (dipping the Host in the Chalice) is to be avoided as it has the potential to transmit an infection.

VEILING CROSSES IN LENT

Veiling crosses in Lent is an old custom in the church, in fact as early as the tenth century in England and the ninth century in continental Europe. In many places it was the practice to veil the altar and the reredos (the sculptured, carved or painted panel behind the altar). This meant that they were screened off from the nave of the church so they couldn't be seen.

In some places, vestments, altar frontals and veils made of unbleached linen were used. Some churches continue that practice. Later, violet vestments and hangings, including the veils, were used as is the practice here at Terrigal.

Eventually, not only crosses and crucifixes were veiled, but also pictures, statues of Christ and the Virgin and icons as well. Lenten veils and omitting the Gloria and the Alleluia during Lent emphasise the penitential character of the season.

Lenten veils are also a dramatic reminder of the separation of sin. It has been suggested that it also symbolises the shroud of sin, its deception and shame. The veil recalls the fig leaves of Adam and Eve. They were afraid to stand before their Creator because of the spoiling of the goodness of creation brought about by sin. Sin distorts and deceives. It causes us to run, to hide, to be secretive. The veil silently reminds us that "the light has come into the world but people loved darkness rather than light, because their deeds were evil" (John3:19).

It could also be that the veil hides a glory we are not yet able to bear. Moses had to put a veil over his face after speaking with God on the mountain. In a figurative sense the disciples had a veil over their eyes when they walked with the Lord to Emmaus. They didn't recognise him until he broke the bread. St Paul says we see though a mirror, dimly. One day we will see face to face. The veil will be removed.

Ultimately, the veils may teach us to recognise the glory of the cross. The veils will finally be removed for the Easter Vigil. We come to see the cross clearly only in the light of the resurrection.
