

WHY WE DO WHAT WE DO

THE HOLY OILS

On Monday of Holy Week this year, a special service was held as it is every year, when fresh oils are blessed by the Bishop in the Cathedral during a special Eucharist or 'Chrism Mass'. These are then taken back to the parishes by the clergy. Christ offered his life as our great high priest on the cross; he prayed his 'highpriestly' prayer at his last supper; so Holy Week is an appropriate time to receive the oils. It also enables us to share in the sacramental life of the whole church as expressed through the diocese and our Bishop. As part of the service, clergy are given the opportunity to renew their ordination vows.

During certain liturgical celebrations of the Church, special oils are used pastorally and sacramentally to assist us in our formation and conversion. Oil has always been used for its healing and soothing qualities. In the ancient biblical world, priests, prophets and kings were anointed with oil to set them apart for their special role.

Jesus is called Messiah or 'Christ', meaning 'Anointed One'. Three oils are used in the sacraments of the church: the oil of the catechumens, the oil of the chrism, and the oil of the sick.

The **oil of the catechumens** has its origin in the early church when new Christians underwent a period of instruction in their new faith. They were called catechumens, meaning "whiterobed". At the beginning of their catechumenate, or period of instruction, they were anointed with oil, and the church prayed that they would be protected from sin and evil as they prepared for baptism.

The **oil of the chrism**, often called simply *chrism*, is the oil used after baptism to sign the newly-baptised on the forehead with the cross. It is also used on the forehead in confirmation, and on the hands at the ordination of a priest. It is a fragrant oil, having been mixed with spices during consecration. It is a sign of the Holy Spirit who anoints all who belong to Christ, the Anointed One.

The **oil of the sick** is used in the sacrament of Anointing the Sick, formerly called extreme unction. It is sign of the healing power of Christ.

A reading from Acts Chapter 3 verses 12 to 20

When Peter saw it, he addressed the people, 'You Israelites, why do you wonder at this, or why do you stare at us, as though by our own power or piety we had made him walk? The God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob, the God of our ancestors has glorified his servant Jesus, whom you handed over and rejected in the presence of Pilate, though he had decided to release him. But you rejected the Holy and Righteous One and asked to have a murderer given to you, and you killed the Author of life, whom God raised from the dead. To this we are witnesses. And by faith in his name, his name itself has made this man strong, whom you see and know; and the faith that is through Jesus has given him this perfect health in the presence of all of you.

'And now, friends, I know that you acted in ignorance, as did also your rulers. In this way God fulfilled what he had foretold through all the prophets, that his Messiah would suffer. Repent therefore, and turn to God so that your sins may be wiped out, so that times of refreshing may come from the presence of the Lord, and that he may send the Messiah appointed for you, that is, Jesus.

A reading from the First letter of John Chapter 2 verses 15 to 17 and chapter 3 verses 1 to 6

Do not love the world or the things in the world. The love of the Father is not in those who love the world; for all that is in the world—the desire of the flesh, the desire of the eyes, the pride in riches—comes not from the Father but from the world. And the world and its desire are passing away, but those who do the will of God live for ever.

See what love the Father has given us, that we should be called children of God; and that is what we are. The reason the world does not know us is that it did not know him. Beloved, we are God's children now; what we will be has not yet been revealed. What we do know is this: when he is revealed, we will be like him, for we will see him as he is. And all who have this hope in him purify themselves, just as he is pure.

Everyone who commits sin is guilty of lawlessness; sin is lawlessness. You know that he was revealed to take away sins, and in him there is no sin. No one who abides in him sins; no one who sins has either seen him or known him.

The Gospel of Our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke Chapter 24 verses 36b to 48

Glory to you Lord Jesus Christ.

While they were talking about this, Jesus himself stood among them and said to them, 'Peace be with you.' They were startled and terrified, and thought that they were seeing a ghost. He said to them, 'Why are you frightened, and why do doubts arise in your hearts? Look at my hands and my feet; see that it is I myself. Touch me and see; for a ghost does not have flesh and bones as you see that I have.' And when he had said this, he showed them his hands and his feet. While in their joy they were disbelieving and still wondering, he said to them, 'Have you anything here to eat?' They gave him a piece of broiled fish, and he took it and ate in their presence.

Then he said to them, 'These are my words that I spoke to you while I was still with you—that everything written about me in the law of Moses, the prophets, and the psalms must be fulfilled.' Then he opened their minds to understand the scriptures, and he said to them, 'Thus it is written, that the Messiah is to suffer and to rise from the dead on the third day, and that repentance and forgiveness of sins is to be proclaimed in his name to all nations, beginning from Jerusalem. You are witnesses of these things.


