Fr. Roy writes: Undoubtedly, you have noticed over the years the connection between the events in the Old Testament and events in the New Testament, especially in the Gospels. To-day's Gospel from Mark, chapter 4, verses 36 – 41 happens on the Sea of Galilee and speaks of Jesus' mastery over the sea.

It is not really a "sea" and more like a freshwater lake. Mark is not writing "Sea" to be taken literally but rather in the way the word is used in the Old Testament that has more than a literal meaning.

In Genesis 1 before creation takes place there is chaos, the earth was without form, "darkness covered the face of the deep" the sea. Then God's Spirit breathed over the "face of the waters" and the first act of creation follows. God is at work with the beginning of creation.

In the rest of the Old Testament references to "the sea" has more than a literal meaning. In the Psalms there are references to a sea monster named Leviathan (Psalm 74, verses 13-14) "You divided the sea by your might you shattered the heads of the dragons in the waters. You crushed the heads of Leviathan and gave him as food to the creatures of the desert waste." In Isaiah 27, verse 1 Leviathan is a serpent and a symbol of Israel's enemies, who will be slain by God. In Job 41, it is a sea monster and a symbol of God's power of creation.

The ancient Israelites proclaimed God's mastery of the sea and all that is in it. In Psalm 95, verse 5 "The sea is his and he made it: his hands moulded dry land."

Then there is the story of the Exodus of the Israelites under the guidance of Moses escaping from the Egyptian Pharaoh in which God parted the sea so that the people could pass through and escape the pursuing Egyptian troops and chariots used in battle.

Now we turn our thoughts to the Gospel reading for this morning with the storm on the Sea of Galilee and all that goes with it, thinking of the ways of looking at the sea in the Old Testament in being taken in more than a literal meaning.

The story is full of fear. The disciples who are fishermen are in the boat at night, in the dark. A gale-force wind starts to blow whipping up a storm on the sea with very large waves that start to fill the boat. Water out of control is a symbol of chaos in biblical literature. Here we have Jesus who is both human and divine asleep in the bottom of the boat. Now this is extreme human tiredness for you. The disciples wake him with the cry "Do you not care that we are perishing?" Jesus rebuked the wind and silenced the sea. Then he said to the disciples "Why are you afraid? Have you still no faith?" Fear and lack of faith go hand in hand, likewise confidence and faith go together. The disciples who had been with Jesus for a long time still did not understand the Person of Jesus, his humanity and Godhead. "Who can this be" they ask.

This question still occupies the minds of communities and people in the chaos of the world to-day. For us it urges us to continue reading the Gospel slowly to allow God to speak to us through the reading in order that we may know Jesus more and more in our lives.

A prayer for you to use that has a familiar ring about it.

May I know you more clearly, Love you more dearly And follow you more nearly, Day by day. AMEN.

Keep well, keep safe and the blessing of God be upon you and on all who you love and pray for and may your days and nights be holy, good and peaceful. AMEN.

- 1 O give thanks to the Lord, for he is good: for his loving mercy is for ever.
- 2 Let the Lord's redeemed say so: whom he has redeemed from the hand of the enemy,
- 3 And gathered in from every land, from the east and from the west: from the north and from the south.
- 23 Those who go down to the sea in ships: and follow their trade on great waters,
- 24 They have seen the works of God: and his wonders in the deep.
- 25 For he spoke, and raised the storm-wind: and it lifted high the waves of the sea.
- 26 They go up to the sky, and down again to the depths: their courage melts away in the face of disaster.
- 27 They reel and stagger like drunkards: and are at their wits' end.
- 28 Then they cried to the Lord in their distress: and he took them out of their trouble.

- 31 Let them thank the Lord for his goodness: and for the wonders that he does for the children of Adam;
- 32 Let them exalt him in the assembly of the people: and praise him in the council of elders.

A reading from The Second Letter of Paul to the Corinthians Chapter 6 verses 1-13.

As we work together with him, we urge you also not to accept the grace of God in vain. For he says, 'At an acceptable time I have listened to you, and on a day of salvation I have helped you.' See, now is the acceptable time; see, now is the day of salvation! We are putting no obstacle in anyone's way, so that no fault may be found with our ministry, but as servants of God we have commended ourselves in every way: through great endurance, in afflictions, hardships, calamities, beatings, imprisonments, riots, labours, sleepless nights, hunger; by purity, knowledge, patience, kindness, holiness of spirit, genuine love, truthful speech, and the power of God; with the weapons of righteousness for the right hand and for the left; in honour and dishonour, in ill repute and good repute. We are treated as impostors, and yet are true; as unknown, and yet are well known; as dying, and see—we are alive; as punished, and yet not killed; as sorrowful, yet always rejoicing; as poor, yet making many rich; as having nothing, and yet possessing everything.

We have spoken frankly to you Corinthians; our heart is wide open to you. There is no restriction in our affections, but only in yours. In return—I speak as to children—open wide your hearts also.

Hear the word of the Lord.
